Granite and Bronze to Perpetuate His Name.

GOVERNOR HILL THE ORATOR

A Description of the Movement Raised for the Memory of Atlanta's Dead Journalist, the First Representative of the New South—The Ceremony.

ATLANTA, Ga., Oct. 31.—Governor Hill and party arrived in Atlanta shortly after 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon. Governor Hill was greeted by crowds of people at the depot station, where he was obliged to make impromptu speeches. The train stopped for five minutes at Salisbury, N. C., and Governor Hill spoke briefly, and at Charlotte he was introduced by Mr. Howell to a large crowd. A few well-timed remarks were made and the train sped on. At Spartanburg, S. C., where the train stopped for a few minutes, there

was a large crowd and here Governor Hill made a brief speech. The limited train stopped just out of Atlanta and the local resort took charge of Governor Hill. At the station there was a large crowd in waiting. Governor Northrup stood at the car steps and welcomed Governor Hill. He escorted him through the station to a carriage drawn by four white horses. The governor was driven to the Kinloch house, only two squares away. Immediately after their arrival the governor and his party retired to their rooms. Arrangements for the welcome of the party had been made by the local committee. The members of this committee went out at 8 o'clock in a special train, leaving with them a brass band and a cannon. The cannon was mounted on a flat car and as the governor's train approached, coming down the hill, it roared a salute which echoed from the hillsides. Governor Hill dined quietly in the hotel at 8:30 p. m. At 9 o'clock went under the escort of a local committee to the city square, where a public reception had been tendered him by Governor Northrup. The occurrence was a magnificent affair. Arrangements for the occasion. Governor Northrup presented his guests to Governor Hill, who included the local committee, Atlanta and members of their families. The reception continued until 1 o'clock, when Governor Hill and his party returned to the hotel and retired.

Early this morning a great and surprising attendance of an approaching event. Special trains which continued to arrive during the entire forenoon brought thousands of visitors from all parts of the south, and the city was in holiday attire to receive them. Local military companies from several of the larger southern cities, and brass bands from many more, accompanied the delegates. The procession formed at 10 a. m., headed for a monument on the old state capitol at 12 o'clock. Directly in front of the capitol in the very heart of the city, the monument stands. The monument proper is made of granite and stands on a terrace with masonry steps, 18 feet square by 4 feet high. The terrace is surrounded by a low wall, the top of which is a balustrade. The pedestal proper stands on a terrace and is about eleven feet high. It consists of three tiers, the top tier of which is molded and supports a polished die with a raised cornice, on which stands the bronze statue of Mr. Grady. The statue is between nine and a half feet high. On either side of the pedestal is a projecting balustrade, on which are seated two bronze statues representing memory and history. On the front of the bases is a large palm branch and wreath in bronze. The inscriptions are as follows:

HENRY W. GRADY, Journalist, Orator, Patriot. Born in Athens, Ga., May 24, 1850. Died at Atlanta, Ga., December 23, 1885. Buried in the State University, the year 1885. Editor of The Atlanta Constitution. He spoke here on the 27th of August, 1888. His words were heard by millions of people. His words were heard by millions of people. Errand Hawk-Eye: We sometimes forget that the nation on the earth has a right to be free. It is a right which is secured by either democracy or republicanism with the meaning attached to the words. The democrats mean that it is the duty of the government to raise the revenue necessary to support the general government, but that it is free trade. The republicans mean that the same revenue may be put into use for some other purpose as we can produce at home and do not have to import so that the duties on these things will not interfere with the progress of home production and reduce duties on raw materials according to this rule. There is no nation that has free trade. All are under it. It is only a question of what is the nation to do with them. If duties are protection, then all have it even England.

We have all the details we need, therefore, if anybody would to apply them here, he will have to pay all the duties on the raw materials. But if a nation comes and says: 'We raise our own cereals, but have sugar and coffee and iron ore, we want what we have—we will open our ports free to your grain,' that is reciprocity. Reciprocity is not a question of the duties on raw materials. We say we cannot produce these things—we are all buyers and so we want our coffee and iron ore, etc. Suppose that another nation had only a partial supply of manufactured goods, but had raw materials, such as iron ore, etc., which we need in part at the time when we could give a special rate to that people on raw materials, we are all benefited.

Then reciprocity is different from any tariff, as it involves special reciprocity which we are all benefited. It opens the door to a mutual reciprocity. It means not a general reciprocity or a general tariff statute, but is a special reciprocity which we are all benefited. It can only be accomplished by the treaty making power which we have in our general policy, defined by acts of congress. But that this is a commercial step of great promise has already been verified by facts.
