IMPORTANT WORLD. A REVOLUTION ON.

Attorney General Miller Drops Some News in Court.

THE BEHRING SEA ARBITRATION

Agreed Upon Between the United States and England - The McKinley Tariff Law Case - Senator Plumb Declines a Duquet, but is Thankful.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11.—The important announcement made in the supreme court of the United States by Attorney General Miller during the argument in the Seaward or Behring sea case that the United States and Great Britain had agreed to submit the Behring sea controversy to arbitration, was the first intimation the correspondence on the subject that has been carried on for some time past between the two countries had at last resulted in a satisfactory agreement. Both sides had agreed to submit the matter to arbitration if an agreement could be reached as to what points should be laid before the arbitrators, but there did not seem to be much prospect of a compromise of opinion on this subject. Attorney General Miller refused to talk about his revelation further than to say that an agreement as to the questions to be submitted for arbitration had been reached, and only awaited the sanction of the senate before being placed before the persons that will be selected by Great Britain and the United States to settle the matter.

Work on the Mint.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11.—Edward O. Leach, the director of the mint, has submitted to the secretary of the treasury a report of the operation of the mints and assay offices for the last fiscal year. The value of the gold deposited at the mints and assay offices during the fiscal year of 1891 was \$30,075,070, against \$40,208,000 in the preceding year, an increase of \$10,986,934. The deposits and purchases of silver aggregating \$70,000,000, the amount of the coinage value of \$89,820,354, against \$66,604,193 in the preceding year, a net increase of \$23,216,161. The coinage executed at the mints was the largest in the history of the mint in this country, aggregating 9,973,387 pieces, valued as follows: gold, \$24,173,892; silver, \$2,039,218. Minor coins, \$1,106,980. Total \$68,811,108. The quantities of the base metal coinage of silver dollar \$92,484, a total of \$6,313,877, the act of 1878, from March 1, 1878, to the close of such coinage, has been 875,092,784. The coinage of silver dollars under his act of March 3, Nov. 1, 1891, has been \$21,398,776, a total coinage of silver dollars since 1878 of \$46,475,388. The net retention on the coinage of silver during the thirteen years ended June 30, 1891, has aggregated \$71,933,300.

Federal Congress.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11.—The fifth annual session of the federal congress began at Willard's hotel in this city with about 434 delegates in attendance. Disruptive demonstrations were avoided during the session with an honor of welcome. The annual address of Hon. A. R. Savage of Maine, the president of the congress, followed. The address was a statement of the benefit of beneficent societies, and the improvement of the human race. The report of the secretary and treasurer, C. M. Blodgett, followed. Last year there were about twenty-seven orders and during the year applications had been received from about eight orders. The report recommended the admittance of individual members from outside societies on payment of dues. The receipts during the year had been \$1,491.94 and the disbursements \$988.23. Reports from the various societies were received after which several subjects were discussed.

Plumb Declines a Duquet.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11.—A delegation of Kansans in Washington called on Senator Plumb and notified him that they proposed to give him a reception. They wanted to celebrate the result of the elections in Kansas. The senator cautiously but firmly declined to be lionized. So far as the occasion was intended to be a personal compliment, under the circumstances he felt that he had done nothing more than his duty in the campaign. As for celebrating the result of the election, he thought the thing to do was to accept the return of so many thousands of his constituents to their party allegiance quietly and thankfully, and without any unnecessary crowing at their expense.

Constitutionality of the McKinley Law.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11.—The United States supreme court has postponed until Nov. 30, argument in the case involving the constitutionality of the McKinley tariff law, and the case in which the law providing for classification of wolverine is attacked on the ground that the speaker had no right to count a sporum.

Brazilian Provinces Secede and Declare Their Independence.

FIGHTING IN RIO GRANDE DESUL.

Fifty thousand Dutch Oppose Fusion, Waging a Campaign After the Name of the Boers in Africa - Pernambuco Also in Revolution and Others to Follow.

LONDON, Nov. 11.—On account of the strict guard kept by the Brazilian government over the telegraph and cable lines, it is almost impossible to obtain reliable news as to the exact state of the country. It is now generally admitted, however, that there is no room for further doubt that the province of Rio Grande do Sul has declared its independence, and as it is reported that the territory includes about 30,000 fighting Germans among its population, the revolution there is undoubtedly serious. As stated in these dispatches, the report had reached here that there had been fighting in the province of Rio Grande do Sul. This report has since been confirmed, and the troops are ordered to sail to the center of Portugal, the capital of Rio Grande do Sul, but as the telegraph wires leading from the supposed scene of the fighting having been cut, some of the exact details of the conflict never gets even so far as Rio de Janeiro.

Merchants and others in this city interested in the finances on trade of Brazil are doing their utmost to obtain some kind of information from their agents in Brazil, but their efforts so far seem to be meeting with much success.

Another province - Pernambuco - has revolted against the dictation of Marshal de Fonseca and has declared itself independent of the government as now constituted. At least two other provinces are on the verge of declaring their independence, and rumor has it that the "restoration" party holds sway in one of the sacred provinces. The report, which comes from Bahia, may have its origin in imperialist circles, but the situation of affairs would seem to indicate a long and bloody civil war in the near future, the overthrow of the present dictatorship, and the establishment in Brazil of a number of separate republics, somewhat similar to those of South America.

Great excitement prevails at Rio de Janeiro and throughout Brazil. It is reported here that Marshal de Fonseca has been informed that he is suffering from a disease which might soon cause his death, and that he has announced his willingness to resign the reins of power.

The German population of Rio Grande do Sul is reported to be organizing into armed bodies of men on the "plan of the Dutch settlers of South Africa, and to be determined to defend the independence of their new state. The troops, under the command of Marshal da Fonseca are held to have been ordered to "move upon Rio Grande do Sul." This report, however, is not believed here, as it is understood that the dictator has been warned by his most trusted advisers to do away with being possible to avoid bloodshed.

A still larger rumor, however, that there has been a conflict, with serious loss of life between the supporters of the government and the colonists who have just declared their independence.

Wanted - One Hundred Thousand Dollars.

CHICAGO, Nov. 11.—William Fitzgerald, a resident of St. Louis, who has brought suit against his brother, Rev. John Fitzgerald, of Norfolk, Va., for \$100,000. John Fitzgerald was the inventor of a plaster used for houses, but he was without means to put his patent on the market and the patent in litigation that in consideration of \$12,000 advanced by William Fitzgerald he was to have a half interest in the same. Mr. Fitzgerald, however, loaned the above amount to William Fitzgerald for a certain interval they were to have in the patent. This was in 1888. These parties allege that the patent plaster has proved a great success; that half a dozen factories in as many cities are engaged in manufacturing the stuff, and they have never received their benefit. The First National bank at Norfolk is made a party to the suit and \$25,000 is reported to be in this bank by the company was attached.

Rain Makers Sell Their Secret.

THOULE, Tex., Nov. 11.—Rain-makers have been at work here. The company built from Kansas, and is styled the "Infernal Artificial Rain Company," with headquarters at Goodland, Kan.
