THEY'RE ALL ABOUT IT.
The Speakership Candidates
Are Hard at Work.
GOSSIP AND FACT OF THE MATTER
Crisp's Adherents Claim a Hundred Votes
on the First Ballot, the MILL Men Are
Sanguine, and the Other Contestants
Cheat an Able Fight.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2.—There is a busi-
ness-like look about the headquarters of
the various speakership candidates. Now
members are arriving constantly and a
majority of them go to the headquarters
of the candidates soon after they reach
the city. The Metropolitan, where
Messrs. Clegg and McMillin are regularly
established, and where Mr. Mills has
a large headquarters, was the scene of
the liveliest interest, and although there
were no developments of a definite
nature, gossip was plentiful and over-
board somewhat sharper. Mr. Mills spent
most of the day at the Metropolitan
hotel, having practically transferred his
headquarters from the Waldorf-Astoria
Hotel, where he and Mr. Williams of Mas-
sachusetts were very prominent around
the room occupied by Mr. Mills and ac-
companied themselves as for the
Texas first, and all time
Representative O'Neill, another Mas-
sachusetts Democrat, announced
himself as for Mr. Clegg. There was
no means an unanimity of opinion
among the fourteen members of the
New England delegation as to a cam-
paign, and a meeting of the members will
be held at the residence of Representative
Andrew Knight for consultation as
to the best policy for the delegation to
pursue in the contest. It is believed
there will be no agreement to send the
bill vote for any one candidate. Mr.
Springer, at the National, and Mr.
Hatch, at Willard's, did not look for
company during the day. They had
many visitors, and confidence was ex-
pressed by their adherents equal to that
of the Mills, Clegg and McMillin men.
It is said that Mr. Springer has received
a very favorable impression on several
New England members, and that he is
their first choice.

One of Mr. Springer's workers said:
"We are at this time not making any
claims except the votes from Illinois, but
we know where our feeling of confi-
dence. You may figure out Mr.
Springer's strength but we will not lay
down anything. However, we have a
right to Mr. Springer as a growing
candidate."—
"We are making no professions of great
strength on the first ballot, I will
however, there will be a difference of
but a few votes between Mr. Springer
and Mr. Mills. We will win, and
which will be in the lead. Mr. Springer
knows his own strength, and whatever
weakness there may be he will not be
concerned with good news and desired
as in the lead. Mr. Springer's head-
quarters were crowded all day."
"There was a growing activity about
Mr. McMillin's headquarters through the
report is persistently circulated that
he is losing some of his strength to Mr.
Mills. One of the gentlemen of his
headquarters told a reporter that there
was nothing in the situation to dis-
courage Mr. McMillin, but that the canvass
was working about as he had calculated.
They felt very sure of their ability to
carry off the election and that they an-
ticipated his nomination on the first
ballot.

THE PUBLIC DEBT.
It Was Cut Over Two Millions During the
Past Month.
WASHINGTON, Dec. 2.—The monthly
public debt statement shows a reduction
in the aggregate of the debt during the
last month of \$2,204,988.24. There was
a reduction during the month of \$4,000,000
in the non-interest bearing debt and
\$899,800 in the debt on which interest
has ceased since January, 1891, and an in-
crease of \$170 in the interest bearing
debt and a decrease of \$145,022.18 in the
surplus cash in the treasury. The ag-
gregate of interest and non-interest
bearing debt, less \$21,129,425.95 paid each
month of principal under the 4-20's and 5-
20's, is \$538,610,988.65. Of this
amount \$25,028,870 is interest-bearing
debt, made up of \$5,072,800 five per cent.
\$21,351,500 2 per cent. bonds and \$8,604,
570 4 per cent. refunding
certificates. The 4-20's and 5-20's
treasury aggregates \$718,350,750, made
up of \$271,843,193 in gold coin and bal-
lotted November, 1890, and \$446,507,557
in paper money, and \$20,706,911 deposited in national banks,
against this aggregate amount there are
abilities to meet gold and silver and
currency certificates in circulation
amounting to \$209,221,709 and current
liabilities amounting to \$18,908,753.
The gold coin and paper money in the
treasury aggregates \$717,842,193, an in-
crease of nearly \$5,000,000 during Novem-
ber, and silver fund amounting to \$147,
895,210, is about \$3,000,000 more than it
was a month ago.

Government Receipts.
From all sources during November
aggregated \$28,917,702, against \$28,096,124
in November, 1890, and \$28,096,124
last month were \$12,551,029, or about
\$5,500,000 less than in November, 1890.
Internal revenue receipts were \$12,429,
324, fully \$1,000,000 more than in No-
vember a year ago, and \$1,000,000 more
than in November, 1890. Government
receipts during the first ten months of
the current fiscal year, or up to
Dec. 1, aggregate \$147,812,291, against
\$128,725,892 during the corresponding
months of the preceding fiscal year, a
falling off of nearly \$20,000,000. On the
