THE BILL PASSED.

Anti-Option Measure Goes Through the Senate.

THE VOTE WAS 29 TO 10. The Hawaiian Association Resolved Today to the Committee on Foreign Relations. The Rest of the Day Taken Up With the Fortification Bill.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—The credentials of Mr. Mills as senator from the state of Texas for the full term beginning March 4 next were presented and placed on the calendar.

Among the petitions presented and referred was one by Mr. Peffer of Kansas for senators to admit soldiers of Kansas and other states.

Mr. Harris of Tennessee reported back from the committee on epidemic diseases the house quarantine bill with a substitute, being the bill passed by the senate some weeks ago with the eighth section omitted. The bill went over at the request of Senator Dyer.

Mr. Dwyer of Massachusetts offered a resolution authorizing the committee on Indian affairs to arrange the necessary referred.

The resolution offered yesterday by Mr. Chandler of New Hampshire requesting the president to enter into negotiations with the representatives of the provisional government of Hawaii was laid before the senate and Mr. Chandler explained the motives for offering it. He moved the reference of the resolution to the committee on foreign relations.

Mr. Dyer of Oregon gave it as his opinion that the time had arrived for a vigorous and conservative American policy and he proceeded to read a long statement of the pro-philippian, trade and commerce of the Hawaiian islands. Before he had concluded the resolution was laid aside without action; the anti-option bill was taken up.

Mr. Walcott of Colorado, opposed the bill on constitutional grounds. He argued on constitutional grounds against the bill and against the George substitute for it. Mr. Higgins of Delaware made an argument in favor of the bill.

After the discussion on the bill was closed and the voting began. The first vote was on the amendment offered by Mr. Viles of Wisconsin to strike from the George substitute the words "option and future" as interpreted by the department and related to objections to and restraints upon commerce between the states and with foreign countries and to be illegal and void. The vote was: Yeas, 21; nays, 60; so the amendment was rejected.

The next vote was on the George substitute, which proposed to declare the laws of the Hawaiian islands null and void and to be illegal and void. It was rejected by a vote of 21 yeas and 60 nays.

This question was then on the passage of the Hawaiian Islands. The vote was: Yeas, 21; nays, 60; so the bill was rejected.

Amendments were offered and rejected to include silver bullion, petroleum and its products, vitrols and liquors, and whiskey among the articles to which the bill should apply. The bill was then passed—Yeas, 60; nays, 21.

Nays—Messrs. Berry, Blodgett, Butler, Caffery, Cannon, Coker, Daniel, Deven, Dixon, Gibson, Sherman, Gray, Harvey, Hill, Hiram, Jones, Jones (Ark), Lefferson, Mills, Palmer, Platt, Pugh, Hanson, Sawyer, Stewart, Vest, Viles, White and Wolcott—29.

Pairs were announced between Messrs. Corbin and Padonick, Aldrich and Quay, Hale and Allen, Jones (Nev.) and Sumners, Pascoo and Casey, Vander Warden.

The bill is the one passed by the house of representatives on June 9, 1897, with certain amendments. The motion for a conference was agreed upon.

The fortification appropriation bill was then taken up. Mr. Sherman's amendment moved to have the Nicaragua bill taken up so as to make it unfinished business for the session. The bill was then discussed and the motion was rejected.

The first amendment to the fortification bill was adopted. The floor and continued the speech which he had begun in the morning on the subject of the annexation of Hawaiian islands. When he closed the consideration of the fortification bill was proceeded with.

No progress, however, was made. The house bill to amend the act for the construction of a wagon bridge across the Missouri river at Sioux City, Ia., was passed, and the senate at 5:30 adjourned.
