A HORRIBLE FIND. Bodies of Five Persons Found In a Box FLOATING DOWN THE MISSOURI.

They Are So Badly Decomposed as to Defy Identification—Supposed to Be a Party of Emigrants—The Jew Divorcé Vendor Escapes Punishment.

St. Joseph, Mo., March 22.—Compton McCoy, a farmer residing a few miles south of this city on the Missouri river banks, was duck hunting on a sand bar Tuesday afternoon, when he discovered a large dry goods box floating with the current. He hauled the box to the shore, breaking it open, was nearly overpowered by a terrible stench which arose from the box. An investigation disclosed that the box was filled with dead bodies in an advanced stage of decomposition, the remains being so badly decomposed that identification was impossible. Coroner Reynolds made an investigation and found the remains were those of four men and one woman and appearances indicate they have been murdered. The remains placed in the box and then set adrift. The community is in a terrible state of excitement. It is supposed the remains are those of a family of emigrants who disappeared in a mysterious manner from Rulo, 40 miles north of this city, last fall.

LET OFF EASY. The Rabbi Who Sold a Divorce Cleared on a Technicality.

CINCINNATI, March 22.—Rabbi Isaac Finkelstein, the Hebrew divine, who sold a divorce to Michael Birk, one of the members of his congregation, escaped conviction in the police court on a technicality. Finkelstein did not attempt to deny the statements of Birk and his wife. Attorney Bob Pugh, who defended him, said he was prepared to prove that it was the custom of the members of the rabbi's church to procure divorces in that way, and that he had acted in good faith. Judge Gregg dismissed Finkelstein on the ground that it required proof of two cases to establish a charge of practicing a trick game. The rabbi was congratulated by the members of his congregation who were present in court and anxiously awaited the outcome of the case.

A CHURCH ROW. Knives, Pistols, Rocks and Broken Heads Mangled Together.

NACUOGUCHES, Tex., March 22.—There was a bloody pitched battle among the members of a negro church, three miles from town, Sunday night, the parson, Rev. Fred Jackson, leading one wing and Sam Forney, one of the elders, with his wife, the other. Pistols, knives, clubs and rocks figured prominently in the melee, which, after a few minutes of vigorous fighting, subsided only to be renewed within half an hour with greater ardor. All the participants were more or less wounded, some of them seriously. John Flanigan had his horse killed under him and stopped two bullets with his body, besides having his head laid open with a blow from a shotgun. Jefferson Bank was also badly wounded by a pistol shot. The participants were all brought in and the grand jury is investigating the trouble.

MAKING THE FINAL PAYMENT. CLEVELAND, March 22.—The city of Cleveland has relinquished all claim against the bondholders of Thomas Axworthy, the defaulting city treasurer. The total amount of Axworthy's embezzlement, that he took from the city treasurer, was about \$300,000. He fled to Europe, where his whereabouts were learned, and he was soon followed by the attorneys of his bondsmen. A compromise was effected and, after turning over his property to the bondsmen, Axworthy returned to this continent and settled in a Canadian city. The final payment of his delinquency has been made to the city. It amounted in round numbers to \$280,000.

HARPER DENIES THE STATEMENT. NEW YORK, March 22.—A press dispatch from Topeka states that State Superintendent McBride intimates that President Harper, of the Mutual Reserve Fund Life association, offered to pay a large sum for campaign purposes last fall by (McBride) would allow the Mutual Reserve Fund to transact business in Kansas. This dispatch was shown Mr. Harper at his office in this city. He denied the charge in the following:

I deny that I or any one of the Mutual Reserve company has bribed or attempted to bribe either Mr. McBride or any other human being.

Selecting a Library For the Home.

PHILADELPHIA, March 22.—A meeting of the committee which is engaged in raising funds for a library for the Childs-Drexel home for union printers, at Colorado Springs, was held in this city. Enough money has been secured to purchase about 200 volumes, and the selection of the books was made the principal subject before the meeting.

Manufacturing Block Burned. CHICAGO, March 22.—The Hoag manufacturing block was destroyed by fire, entailing a total loss of \$85,000; insurance about \$31,000.

Swedish Consul Dead. CHICAGO, March 22.—Peter Svance, Swedish and Norwegian consul at Chicago, died at his home Monday night of pneumonia.


