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CASH TO BE SCARCE,

MORE FAILURES MAY NOW BE LOOKED FOR.

Washington, May 13.—The recent bank failures at Chicago and Indianapolis, will make money tighter than ever.

WASHINGTON, May 13.—The failure of National Banks in Chicago and Indianapolis, following the recent financial disturbances in New York and elsewhere, is causing great uneasiness.

Officials are informed that treasury circles are means a tightening of the lines on all matters of loans, and will make money so scarce that fancy securities will become practically valueless for borrowing purposes.

The condition of the gold reserve is also a matter of concern. It is feared that other failures may follow from like causes.

Government officials are not at all surprised at the developments of financial distress, but say there is no hope for relief except from Congress.

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IOWA STATE ITEMS.

On the 27th the live-stock yards company at Sioux City was compelled to assign, owing to the previous failure of Sioux City enterprises.

Judge Gardner in the district court at Sioux City appointed a receiver for the Sioux City Rapid Transit Company, owner of the elevated railway.

The application was made by E. W. Skerry, trustee for the stockholders, who are mostly residents. A. M. Jackson was appointed receiver, and his bond fixed at \$10,000.

The auditor of state has issued a certificate to the Farmers and Traders State bank at Jewell Junction; capital stock, \$30,000. H. H. Alexander is president and A. C. Alexander cashier, and to the Iowa Savings bank of Cedar Rapids, capital stock, \$50,000. The president is James D. Douglas and the cashier J. W. Hradsh.

The postoffice at Dallas Center was burglarized a few nights ago. The safe was blown open and about \$150 in stamps were taken and a small amount of cash. Quite an amount of valuable paper was left undisturbed.

It was very quietly done as the family living overhead knew nothing about the matter till the discovery was made by Postmaster Fox next morning.

In a fire in a boarding house in Burlington late at night, six men were burned to death. It is not known how the fire started, but one person was awakened, and did all in her power to warn the sleeping boarders.

All were able to escape but six men—E. G. Schuman, a carpet weaver, Joseph Swindler, a plasterer, and four others who were so badly burned as to be unrecognizable.

Resolutions were passed favoring the order of deaconesses and also local evangelists. Fort Dodge was chosen as next place of meeting.

The state crop bulletin says: Another cold, stormy, and winless week, making the third week of unfavorable weather in the first month of the crop season. The conditions, however, are more favorable than May 1 of last year. Grass and winter grain has been benefited by the wet weather, but late sown small grain is rotten to some extent. Many reports show destruction of young pigs, and the probable spring pig crop will fall 70 to 75 per cent below the average.

For some time there has been a fight in the district court at Keokuk over the possession of a minor child belonging to John J. Finnerty and wife.
