Norfolk News: Another has been added to the number of diphtheria victims who have died near Hoskins this winter. Sam G. Braun, a young man of 22 years of age, is the last he having died about midnight Thursday evening at his home northeast of Hoskins and the funeral will take place at the church this side of Hoskins. Mr. Braun was a school teacher and taught the school in the Wolschlagler district this winter. He formerly taught the school in the village which is now presided over by John Barnes of this city. The father of the deceased is a minister, Rev. J. B. Braun residing at Duncan and has been with his boy since he was taken with the disease. This disease seems to be gaining quite a foothold in that neighborhood and fears are entertained that it will become malignant and epidemic.

The lecture given by Judge W. F. Norris at the opera house on Thursday night, under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A., was listened to with the closest attention throughout. He had chosen for his subject "The Spaniard in America," and he portrayed in a most vivid manner, the inhumanity, barbarity and treachery of the Spaniard from the beginning of Spanish conquests in Cuba on the western continent to the present blood-curdling scenes in Cuba of today, showing a trail of blood from beginning to end during a period of four hundred years, the Spaniards at one time having owned a large portion of the new world. The terrible Spanish outrages began in Cuba and will end in Cuba in a very short time. The Judge as a speaker has no superior in the state, and being thoroughly versed in history, and having a powerful memory, his lectures are of unusual interest, and just at this time the subject he chose was most appropriate. The proceeds of the lecture amounted to about \$41.00, one-half of which will be sent to the proper authorities to aid in the Cuban relief work. The band and orchestra are deserving of praise for the splendid music furnished for the occasion.

Come now, fusionists, be honest. Are you not getting just a little tired of Bryanism?

There is a gradual feeling of weariness over-coming the people in regard to the war question.

So long as Hon. Jno. M. Thurston resides in Nebraska, she will stand in the front rank in the art of oratory.

The Trans-Mississippi Exposition will be to the Central West what the World's Fair at Chicago was to the United States.

An odorless onion has been discovered, but who discovered it is not made public. It must have been some "sweet scented" person.

Democracy captured Sioux City, bag and baggage at the municipal election held on Monday, the republicans only electing two alderman.

Thirty-six creamery associations have been organized in Nebraska during the past year. Who says the cow is not a winner, and a sure one at that.

The elections have been held in Spain and Minister Sagasta won the day. The result may have a decided effect on the war question as the present minister desires peace instead of war.

Watch for the issue upon which the populists of Nebraska will fight their campaign this fall. If you observe that the main issue is "the free and unlimited coinage of silver," please remind us of it.

The city of Seattle recently elected a republican mayor and was not sparing in the majority, yet Bryan received over one thousand majority in the city President. The Seattleites are not of prosperity, which they know they see it.

Even Bryan has said that McKinley has pursued and is pursuing the right course in the Cuban question; in fact, the whole people of this country realize that President McKinley is President and that he is all and more than was ever claimed for him. His name will be linked with American history the same as Washington and Lincoln.

While there are no signs of "prosperity" (the Bryan kind, and our people are starving to death on every hand, and things in general going to the "demition pow paws," special freight trains during both day and night are kept busy hauling in and out, car load after car load of cattle, hogs, graft, lumber, machinery, merchandise, in fact, almost everything. It's too bad.

A way out here in Nebraska, the land of sunshine and plenty, the people do not realize the terrors of war, and that word of horrors, the starvation that is going on in Cuba. Nevertheless the people of this great commonwealth are patriots, and the state will furnish her quota to fight for the cause of liberty, in addition to furnishing the products to feed millions. Here, there is absolute safety, and no nation or nations with their armies can ever invade the United States to the borders of fertile Nebraska.

The fusionists now have only one lone song to sing, but alas, the notes have become so strained and discordant that the most efficient tuner, W. J. Bryan, cannot revive it's once popularity. It runs like this: "No prosperity, no prosperity, no pros-hic-pros-per-hic-ity. No 'sperity, whoop." Look about and see the miserable condition of everybody around you; see the people starving to death, see the price of everything going to the dogs, because of the death of the free coinage of silver. Woe, woe, woe. Do you see it? Then what's the matter with you.

**SENATOR THURSTON SPEAKS!**

His Peroration a Magnificent Appeal for Cuba's Freedom. Public Interest in His Speech Intense.

Not since the inauguration of President McKinley has there been such a crowd in the Senate chamber as that which greeted Nebraska's peerless orator, Senator John M. Thurston, of whom every loyal Nebraskan is proud, when he spoke on the Cuban question last Thursday. It was one of the most eloquent and forcible addresses ever delivered in the Senate chamber. The Chicago Inter Ocean, in speaking of the address says:

"John M. Thurston of Nebraska, speaking by command of his dead wife and pleading for the dying women and children of Cuba, has summoned the American people to a holy war against Spain. The clarion of battle rang through his sentences and mingled its notes with the sobbing of the muffled drums of lamentation for the victims of Spanish cruelty. He ended with a stanza from 'The Battle Hymn of the Republic.' Another line from that immortal poem—'He hath sounded forth a trumpet that shall never call retreat'—best describes the orator's discourse as a whole. It was a magnificent companion piece to the calm, judicial report given by Senator Proctor.

There was perfect stillness when Mr. Thurston uttered his first sad sentence and that stillness continued as he proceeded. The only point at which the galleries appeared to be ready to break into applause was when he said:

"Let the men who love the dollar stand aside, and let the men who love the flag come to the front." The Vice-President interposed to stop the outbreak of applause.

Mr. Thurston's preparation was delivered with intense force and feeling, and when he closed with the words:

"I will meet death fearlessly, as did my beloved, in the cause of humanity, under the American flag," the long pent-up feeling of the audience burst through all restraint.

Public interest in the speech of Senator Thurston was intense. The doors of the galleries were besieged by hundreds unable to gain admission. Nearly every Senator was in his seat. Many members of the House were standing along the southern wall. The diplomatic gallery was full, and in all other galleries there was not a vacant space. Mr. Thurston's every word was enunciated with remarkable clearness and precision, and was heard distinctly in the remotest part of the hall. As he neared the end his voice trembled perceptibly. In delivering the last words it broke completely. Many of the staid old Senators were visibly affected.

When Senator Thurston concluded with a touching reference to his wife, who died in Cuba last week, and sank in his seat overcome by emotion, the galleries forgot the rule which forbids any expression of approval or disapproval. Senator Cockrell had called attention to the rule. The Vice-President gave the caution that the rule must be observed or the galleries would be cleared. These were precautions taken because a great crowd had surged through the corridors of the capitol all morning, seeking admission to the galleries to hear the Nebraska Senator speak.

The Senate rule would have been more revered had it never been read, for when Thurston's speech was concluded there was an unparalleled scene. While the Senator sat with head bowed upon his hands, the emotion he felt swept over the Senate and galleries. There was applause everywhere, in the galleries and on the floor, and it continued while Senator Allen crossed over to his colleague and led him from the chamber. The scene at the close of the speech was one that can never be forgotten. The traditions of the Senate were shattered by grief for Cuba and wrath against Spain.

It has been proclaimed broadcast that the Wall street gamblers who speculate in stocks and bonds, are largely instrumental in preventing justice being meted out to the Spaniards, but not until the junior Senator of Nebraska spoke before the Senate in a manner not to be misunderstood, condemning this clique of Wall streeters did the people realize the immensity of their organization and its corrupting influences. Senator Thurston has frequently been charged with being a corporation attorney and controlled by capital, but his sweeping denunciation of this body of Wall street gamblers clears his character of such base charges.

The Northeastern Nebraska Press Association convenes at Emerson on the 22nd ult., at which time the boys are expected to "rally round the flag," swap lies about ready prints, proclaim the guilt of each other in regard to the price charged for legal printing, and other things too numerous to mention. But the best part of it is, the members of the press get together, get acquainted, get a day off from business cares, and are all the better for it. Every paper in Northeastern Nebraska should have a representative present, as all have bran new mileage, and the press is promised the hospitality of Emerson.

**HAS KEPT FAITH.**

The rejuvenation of the country which has taken place during the past twelve months under Republican rule can best be appreciated by comparing present conditions with those which existed under the Democratic administration that ended on March 31st, 1897. During the four years immediately preceding that date the chronic and constitutional incapacity for governing which is the chief characteristic of the Democratic party was manifested as never before. By the enactment of that stupendous failure known as the Wilson bill the mills and factories of the country were compelled to stop work, industry was paralyzed, insufficient revenue was secured, the national debt was needlessly increased by hundreds of millions of dollars, and confidence in the business world was utterly destroyed. The country, in every respect, was in a lamentable condition when the Republicans came into power. Yet within the short space of one year all this has been changed. Republicanism resumed its old job of National housekeeping, the country and its affairs were speedily put in order, energy and wisdom supplanted slothfulness and folly, and we are again on a paying basis. The Republican party has kept its promises, has maintained faith with the people, and has once more demonstrated that it is able to grapple with any emergency and guide the Union into the path that leads to plenty and prosperity.—Cincinnati Commercial Tribune.

Facts and figures don't lie.
