WAYNE'S GROWTH!

The Improvements of the Year 1898 Amount to Over \$50,000.00.

EVIDENCES OF PROSPERITY.

Wayne Takes First Place Among the Cities of the Same Class in the State.

It is a source of much satisfaction to again be able to give a list of the annual improvements in the city of Wayne, a matter that has been neglected for a number of years, because the amount each year was too small to justify publication. For the year 1898, however, it is very different. The city has made material advancement and now ranks first among the cities of the same class in the state. Aside from a Normal College, Water Works, and a Telephone system, a new and splendid Electric Light plant, the property of the city, has been constructed and is now in operation, and when completed a light will be placed at the corner of nearly every block in the city. A fine \$100,000 Presbyterian church and another structure to which the citizens can point with pride as among the permanent improvements. A number of large and handsome residences have been built. Taken all in all, the citizens have just reason to be proud of the record of improvements and the progress of Wayne for the past year. The building throughout the county has been enormous and amounts to many thousands of dollars, and undoubtedly exceeds that of any previous years.
