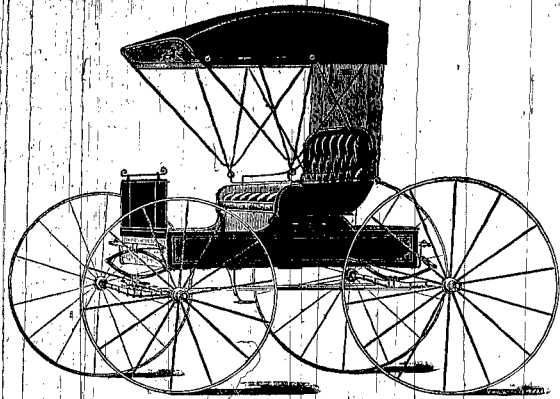

During the past month a number of citizens have been in Lincoln investigating the state normal question, but a complete understanding as to the true condition of affairs pertaining to the location of the schools has been difficult to obtain. However, last week Messrs. Norris, Britton, LeV, Bressler, Mitchell, Mallon and others went to Lincoln to make further investigations, but at this time the exact conditions are not known; though it is believed Wayne has as good, or even a better chance to secure one of these institutions than any other place outside of Lincoln. As the matter stands now, a bill for a normal at Wayne, introduced by Senator Hale, will undoubtedly pass the Senate. A bill known as the Melbourne bill has been ordered on file with amendments. It provides for an appropriation of \$20,000, for the purchase of sites and the erection of two state normals, the location to be designated by the state board of education, which is comprised of seven members. That this bill will be defeated there is little doubt. The Wayne bill is by far the best offered, as the school could be established at once and only an appropriation for its maintenance would be required, and who is there that will not admit in his own mind that Wayne is the most desirable point for the location of one of these institutions.

**Ordinance No. 113.**

An ordinance to prevent the dangerous practice of boys and others stealing rides on cars, trains, locomotive engines operated by steam within the City of Wayne, and providing penalties for the violation of this ordinance.

Whereas accidents are liable to happen by boys and others jumping on or catching hold of cars, trains and engines operated by steam, with the intent or purpose of stealing or obtaining rides thereon without paying fare, therefore

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Council of the City of Wayne:

Section 1. That it shall be and hereby is declared unlawful for any boys or other persons to steal or attempt to steal a ride on any cars, trains, engine or engines operated by steam in the City of Wayne, or to jump on and off, or with such intent or purpose to steal a ride, to stand on top or to hang onto the sides or rear of any such cars, trains or engines, or in any way to get upon the same.

Section 2. That any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in a sum not exceeding ten dollars.

Sec. 3. It is hereby made the duty of the marshal or police officers of the City of Wayne to promptly arrest and detain any boy or other person violating any of the provisions of the foregoing section. And it is also made the duty of the conductor of any train or engine operated by steam, to arrest and detain any boy or other person violating any of said provisions, or to take such other actions, by securing the name or arrest of the offender as he may have time, means or opportunity to do.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication as required by law.
