What has become of the free coinage of silver at 16 to 1 question.

A cold wave arrived Saturday night and the balmy weather of the first day of March was dashed to earth.

The state legislature could not refuse to give effect to the will of a large majority of the republicans of the state.

Osborne Deignan, one of the heroes of the Merrimack, has been appointed as one of the cadets at the naval academy.

The "pass" question seems to cause the legislators no end of grief and pleasure as it is haggled over down at the state house.

To all appearances Senator Quay of Pennsylvania will be defeated for re-election, although no senator may be elected from that state.

The wages of ten thousand mechanics and laboring men throughout the east were increased 10 to 12 1/2 per cent the past week. Doesn't it smack of prosperity?

It is now Admiral Dewey, the office of Admiral having been created for him by an act of congress. It is one which the whole American people recognize as truly merited.

A tornado visited Madisonville, Tennessee, Saturday night, destroying a vast amount of property besides killing three persons and wounding ten or twelve others.

The naval powder magazine at Toulon, France, was blown up Sunday morning, causing a frightful loss of life and property, the killed and wounded numbering more than a hundred.

Nebraska will be obliged to wobble along now without her oil inspector even if she has to blow up, the legislature having passed a bill abolishing the office. The voice of the people cries out, all right.

The closing scenes of the great war congress on Saturday according to all reports, was worth living a life time to see. Contrasted with that of 20 years ago it seems strange, but the fact is forever settled that this is a thoroughly united country. Is it any wonder that the closing scenes in congress were so patriotic?

The most distinct sample of the "White Man's Burden" in Nebraska is the distorted creation known as the blanket ballot, whereby the name of a candidate of the three party conglomeration may appear three times on the ballot while that of his opponent cannot appear but once. Bills to rectify this burden have been passed by both the House and Senate and the question is, will Governor Foynter dare veto it?

The Fifty-fifth Congress adjourned on Saturday. It has been one of the most memorable sessions in the history of the nation, and will ever be remembered for its remarkable achievements.

The fusionists will be obliged to write their song of reform in a different key, as it has long since lost its popularity. The symphony is worn out. Auditor Cornell was too fond of the insurance business.

The State Business Men's Association is making strenuous efforts to have certain laws passed by the present legislature. Many of the bills are worthy of consideration and great good would result from their passage.

Auditor Cornell's friends insist that he should not resign because he has not violated the law. Neither did Eugene Moore and the courts have so held, but there is the moral stigma of defalcation and theft attaching to him, just the same.—Promont Tribune.

Brad Slaughter has been appointed paymaster in the United States army with the rank of Major. The only redeeming feature of the appointment is that it will remove from the state a very undesirable factor in the republican party. This well.

Who knows? Nebraska may yet furnish the speaker of the House of Congress. Dave Mercer is making an enviable record as a congressman. He is tireless in his efforts to secure whatever he goes after and seldom fails. Along this line he has made a notable record and Nebraska feels proud of him.

As great as were the exports of 1898 it seems likely that the American manufacturer will send 1899 down in history as a record-breaker in this line. The exports of domestic manufactures are already \$28,000,000 in excess of any previous given period and while they now amount to over \$1,000,000 a day evidence are not lacking that they will go much higher during the spring months. But while this is true our manufacturers are supplying the home market as never before in the history of the country. The imports of manufactured goods during the last seven months decreased to \$147,200,872 a marked falling off over the same period of last year, leaving a clear trade balance in our favor of \$95,000,000 on these goods alone. If any more satisfactory evidence of thoroughly healthy prosperity is wanted by the calamity howler he must be even more unreasonable than his worst enemy has heretofore supposed.—Bee.

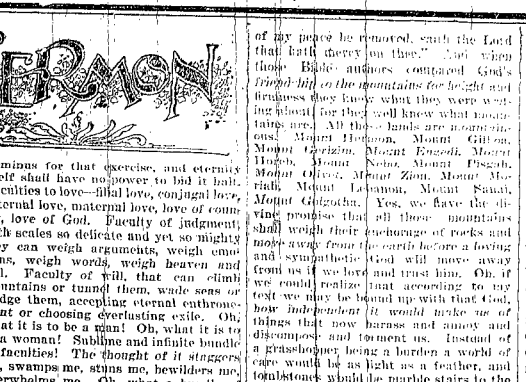
