## COUNTY TEACHERS' MEETING.

March Session of Wayne County Teachers' Association Proves an Interesting One—Fifty Teachers' Attendance.

The monthly teachers' meeting of Wayne county, Nebraska, was held in the Presbyterian church at Wayne on Saturday, March 11th, about 50 teachers being present.

The association was called to order by the president, Miss C. M. White, and the opening exercises were conducted by Rev. Theo. Bithell. Miss Stella Besser then read a very good paper on the subject "Does our manner of teaching interfere with Character Building?" She showed how each teacher should keep in mind the importance of the part each teacher should play in the pupil's daily life.

An account of the absence of Mr. Geo. Besser the next subject, "Geography," was omitted. In her talk on "Primary Reading and Language," Mrs. W. I. Lowery gave some methods she used in teaching "beginners" to read. This talk was very instructive, and the discussion that followed brought many methods used by different teachers.

The association then adjourned for the noon hour.

At 1:30 the association was again called to order and Miss Anna Gamble sang a solo "Bless the Name of Mother." Miss Gamble has a very fine voice of which she seems to have perfect control and the song well deserved the hearty applause it received.

As no one on the afternoon program was present, Mr. Eugene Blakely proposed that the association discuss the subject "How much good has the association done for me during the year?" and Prof. Howard was asked to open the discussion and then others followed.

Mrs. Bright then spoke on "What the home needs from the teachers' standpoint." She spoke about the effect the training had upon the moral character of the child, also that the child should be taught to obey at home and this would keep it from any trouble at school. The child should be taught manners and treated to love home, also that to be successful in the training of her pupils, the teacher must have the co-operation of the home. The talk allowed much preparation and was one of the most instructive and interesting papers of the association this year. After the discussion the association adjourned until May.

SPRING JOBBING DEMAND

Active in All Lines, Especially Dry Goods and Clothing

NEW YORK. Business is active in all lines and trade activity is still a prominent feature of the general business situation. Price strength, too, is notable, especially in view of the midwinter rise of February, except in the case of leading cereals and wool. The manufacturing lines the situation is one of great vitality. The iron and steel trade is still exceedingly active and several prominent manufacturers report a demand for cotton goods is very active and nearly all classes are firmly held, though finished goods have not advanced to the same extent as the order makes. 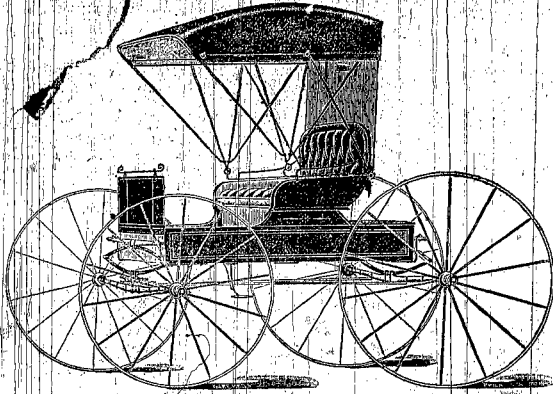
