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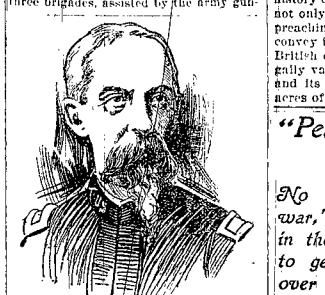

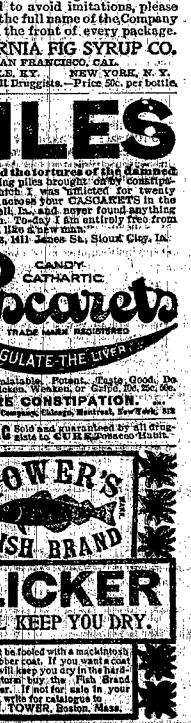

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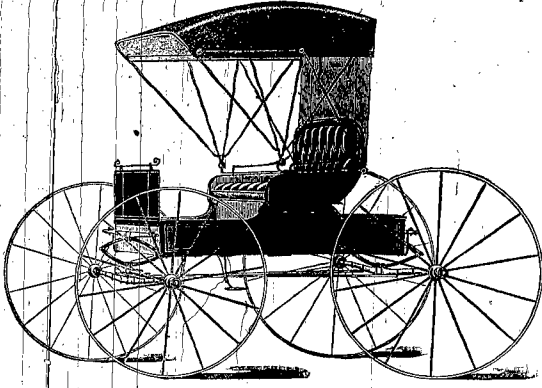

## IN THE ENGINE ROOM.

A source of annoyance and discomfort in a factory is powder smoke that the ventilators discharged into the engine and fire rooms in great quantities, says a writer in the *Cassier Magazine* who served as assistant engineer in the New York. This made one's eyes sore and indeed, coughing that was distressing, the evil being worse below than at the guns, where the wind drove the smoke away. When finally dispelled, it left a soapy gray sediment over everything, making a general cleaning up necessary. The report of guns, particularly those near the open hoods of ventilators, was loud and painful in the engine-rooms, the sharp crack of the smaller ones being more annoying than the duller roar of the larger guns.

Concession from much firing of the guns brought an element of anxiety and some danger into the engine-rooms. Glass in bulletins and billboards was broken and tumbled down through the gratings over the engines, accompanied with hard chunks of putty and red lead. Long-lost tools and material were scattered about, and the workmen were obliged to clean up the mess. As small a thing as a half-inch bolt or a screwdriver might produce a fatal breakdown at a critical moment by getting mixed with the eccentricities or crankpin connections.

Experience showed that the gun, as well as the ram and the torpedo, was fired from a shell that struck the New York and exploded in the engine room. The bridge came down, the main engine room ventilator and fell at the feet of the writer, several splinters from a boat destroyed by the shell coming with it. No personal danger attended this incident, as the fragment was not larger than a walnut, and fell by gravity, its energy having been expended by hitting objects on deck before it penetrated the ventilator. It showed, however, that armor gratings are not perfect protection against bursting shells. There were similar experiences on other armored ships. In one case on board the Brooklyn, a chief mechanic in the engine-room was hit by a piece of copper rotating band from a shell that exploded above the protective gratings.

## THE DATE FOR EASTER.

An industrial college of statistics who has been investigating the Easter festival in the various times of the Easter festival. In 1883 and 1894, he says, Easter fell on the unusually early date of March 22, but in the three following centuries it will occur only eight times on that date, namely, in the years 1931, 2035, 2046, 2057, 2103, 2114, 2125 and 2198.

Going to the other extreme, Easter never comes later than April 25. It is on such a late date on this date in 1608, 1734 and 1850, and in the next century will reach it only once—in 1943.

## Easter Customs.

All the world over may be found the superstition that at least one new article must be worn upon Easter day, which accounts in our country for the ravishing display of bonnets at church on Easter morn.

German families on Easter eve place a nest full of sugar eggs and real eggs somewhere in the garden, so the children will have a hunt for them on Easter morning. Strange to say, these Easter eggs are believed by the German children to be laid by the hare, and a common sight in a confectioner's window is to see this species of animal sitting on a nest of eggs.

In southern France a custom peculiar to the Easter week is the carrying of the streets of a crowd of young and gay gallants carrying a chair lined with rich white silk, decorated with garlands of flowers and streamers of ribbon.
