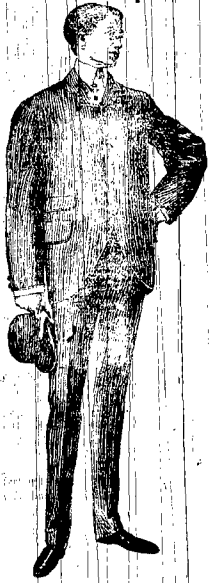

The experiment will be closely watched and may prove of great benefit to the doctor and his patients.

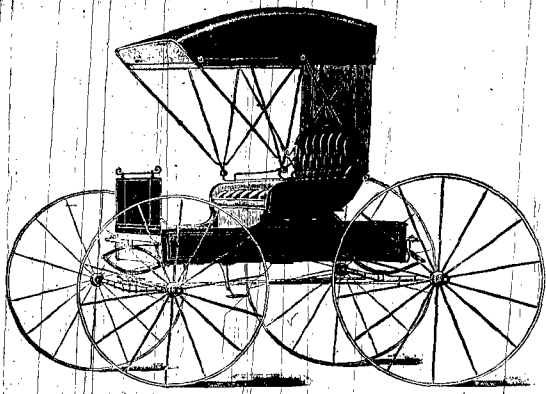

The nation's financial integrity—its honor—was being attacked with a virulence never before equaled and with a hope of success on the part of those making the attack that increased greatly the peril of the situation. The equities of justice, to the highest in the land, were being threatened, and a business depression threatened over the entire country. The alleged business enterprises have resumed through a corrected tariff law that seems so nearly to meet the requirements that a score of years may pass before another will be substituted; prosperity is upon us or near at hand in measure not predicted before in a generation; gold has come back to us like a flood; the gold standard is felt once more to be securely unshakable; and the national credit has been raised to a height never before attained.

Briefly summarized, two more wholesome, eventful, epoch making years are not to be found in the national career than the two years now completed under President McKinley, no matter from what point viewed—whether in the industrial strides taken, the glory won by our army and navy, the genius of yachting gained through our many newly acquired and fabulously productive island possessions or in the enhanced national respect felt for us by other nations. To the man, therefore, who has been so largely and loyally a part of this great forward movement of the nation—Wm. McKinley—a full meed of praise.

## To See Cuba Is To Be Convinced.

All Americans who have visited Cuba since the evacuation of the Spanish come back ardent nationalists. After personally inspecting conditions on the island they return convinced that there is but one way to save Cuba from a fresh chapter of misery and misery. Among those who have recently visited the island is Henry M. Field, the well-known religious editor. He spent two months in Havana, Cienfuegos and Santiago. When asked what the attitude of this country should be towards Cuba Mr. Field replied: "I can answer that very briefly. It's our holy duty to hold Cuba with a strong firm hand. The idea of throwing the reins to those people is monstrous. It would mean anarchy." Mr. Field added that the policy should be to hold the island with a gloved hand of iron. His humanity will not be doubted. But weakness is not benevolence, nor is trusting to luck in government philanthropy. To leave Cuba to itself at any near period would surely result in renewed civil war and chaos.

Those who argue otherwise have not seen Cuba. It is significant fact that correspondents of the non-expansionist press take the same view. One of these from Boston, writes to his paper that the "three millions are here in the harbor. They lie here while Cuban politicians wrangle over the channels of distribution and create feonious which quarrel and call each other traitor." The correspondent grows quite radical and insists that the Cuban army "should have been knocked to pieces at the very beginning of the American occupation." A wiser course has been pursued, but the difficulties of the case plain to all who are brought face to face with them. The withdrawal of the United States would be the signal for a fresh reign of terror. As we have undertaken, in the presence of the world, to give Cuba a stable government the task will be performed, and its fulfillment inevitably demands eventual annexation.—Globe Democrat.

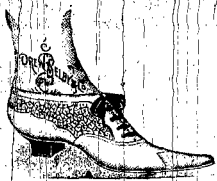
