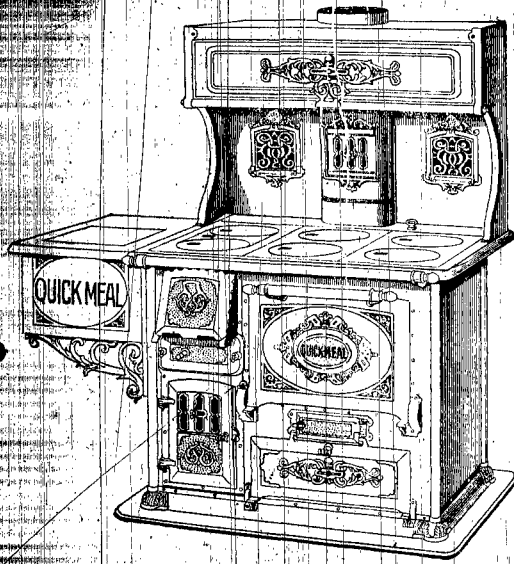

## MONEYED MEN MEET.

The Second Annual Meeting of the Northeast Nebraska Bankers' Association Held in Wayne.

## TOPICS OF INTEREST DISCUSSED.

A Large Attendance—Officers Elected—Harrington Selected as the Place for Holding the Next Annual Meeting—Bankers Tendered a Banquet.

On Friday of last week the city of Wayne, the pride of Northeast Nebraska, was honored by the bankers of this section of the state and it can be justly emphasized that they were a crowd of good looking and pleasant gentlemen, representing the wealth, culture and business sagacity of Northeast Nebraska. It was the second annual meeting of the association, and was, without doubt, one of the most successful affairs ever held in this section of the state, or any other, for that matter.

The early morning trains brought in the sons of capital from every direction, the reception committee being present at the depot to receive them and to escort them to the hotels. Mayor Ley turned the keys of the city over to the gentlemen, and judging from the many happy expressions and comments their lips were certainly a pleasant and profitable one. May they find it convenient to meet in the city, again is the wish of all.

The attendance at the meeting was large, thirty-six towns and fifty-seven banks with a capital of over five million dollars, being represented. The bankers outside of the district present were: J. P. Manley, Geo. H. Rathman, F. A. Black, F. A. McCormack, Jas. P. Toy and Geo. P. Day, of the Sioux National, L. S. National, First National, Iowa State National, First National and Merchants' National banks of Sioux City; Chas. R. Hannam of Council Bluffs; Luther Drake and V. B. Caldwell of Lincoln; E. L. Hall of Lincoln, and J. T. Coad Jr. of Omaha, state bank examiners. The meetings were held in the Masonic hall and the proceedings which followed were of a decidedly interesting nature.

At 9:00 o'clock the banquet given by the local bankers of the city under the auspices of the ladies' aid society of the Presbyterian church, was attended by seventy-two gentlemen. Masonic hall was handsomely decorated with the profusion of flowers and plants. A beautiful arch of flowers was tastefully arranged at the head of the tables, brilliantly lighted with electricity, beneath which were the most delicious refreshments which the frugal served. The decorations, which were elaborate, were furnished entirely by Mrs. Ley. The tables fairly groaned under the load of viands and good things which being lighted to the inner man, while beautiful strains of music from the harp of Soussana floated through the hall. W. H. Bucholz, the genial, whole-souled banker of Norfolk, very happily presided as toastmaster at the conclusion of the banquet. Among the toasts were "The Stock Holder," responded to by J. E. Manley of Sioux City; "Expansion," responded to by R. A. Stewart of Norfolk; "The Ideal Bank Customer," J. F. Toy, Sioux City; "The Ideal Banker," G. L. Hannam, Council Bluffs; "The Day of the Banker," R. Gurney, Laurel; "Discount and Interest," E. T. Kearney, Jackson; "Northeast Nebraska," E. A. Wittale, Pender. Luther Drake of Omaha, in a brief address, complimented the ladies for the elegant banquet they had spread, and also thanked the local bankers and citizens for the generous hospitality extended to the association. The closing toast of the evening was "Signs of the Times," responded to by R. A. Stewart of Norfolk. Mr. Stewart, a happy speaker and for several moments he kept the guests convulsed with laughter. The responses of E. R. Gurney of Laurel, address of the evening, were exceptionally good. In fact, for nearly two hours sparkling wit, humor and pathos flowed forth, freely combined with rhetoric and oratory.

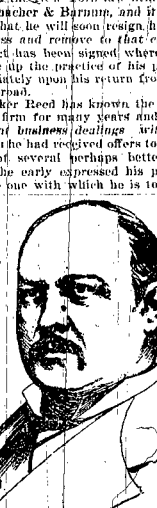

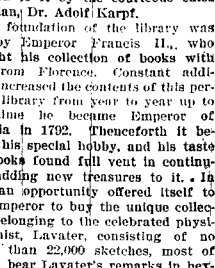

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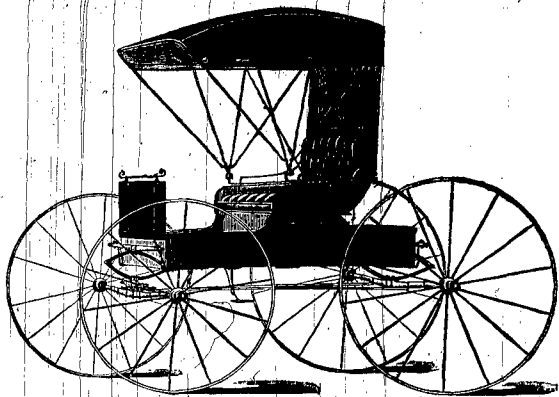

A telephone rate war was inaugurated by the Bell Telephone company last Saturday by reducing the rates at Banoroff, Cedar, Emerson, Dakota City, Hubbard, Sioux City, South Sioux City, Wayne, Winslow and Thurston to 15 cents. The Iowa Telephone company promptly followed suit. In some cases the future rate will be cut one-fourth as high as former rates. The rate at Banoroff to South Sioux City, Hubbard, Dakota City, Emerson, Thurston, Penader, Banoroff, Wayne and Winslow. The rate to the first named will be 10 cents and the others 15 cents for every additional minute. Wakfield is of course included in both lists.  
During the past two or three years the scarcity of feeding cattle grown on farms of the West has induced a great many feeders to look to the ranch as a more happy, for the prices were unreasonably high and the quality of the stock so poor as to cause an immense amount of loss to the feeder. The experience has furnished an object lesson in favor of growing the feed at home. Another lesson is just now being supplied by the experience of the northwestern ranchmen. They have been relying on young Texans to consume their grass, but the ideas of the Texas cattlemen as to the value now put this class of cattle out of the reach of the western ranchman, and the latter is determined to grow his own cattle. The decision is a wise one and western farmers for whenever a grazing or feeding section relies upon some other sections of country for stock to consume its feed stuffs, prices are sure to be so high when the stock is in the market that it will leave no profit for the feeder. The western ranchman can stand this better than the middle-west farmer, for he can do without stock. If the grass is not eaten up then it is a loss to him, but he is not obliged to make a profit from it, while the farmer has his means invested in his farm and is obliged to utilize the ground's products or lose the results of his labor. Many a farmer has lost money by feeding cattle, but no farmer ever lost any money by growing and feeding them Iowa Home-Stead.
