Nebraska Democrats Score. LINCOLN, Neb., Dec. 14.—The Democrats of Nebraska are in a frenzy over the action of Bryan since his nomination for appointment of Allen, Populist, to the vacant Senatorship as against Hitchcock, Democrat. The inside of the affair is now public property. Allen urged Bryan to put pressure on Governor Poynter to have him appointed, since Poynter was about to appoint Hitchcock, and explained that if Hitchcock was appointed the next Legislature would have to give the other Senatorship to a Populist, and in that event it could not go over in the event he was beaten for the Presidency. He further urged Bryan to act, threatening that if he did not (he Allen) would be a Presidential candidate before the next national Populist convention. It was then that Bryan wired Poynter that he must appoint Allen and not Hitchcock.

The Democrats are crying ingratitude and boldly announce that there will be a contest in Bryan since his nomination against Bryan which will also be carried to the national convention.

The plan as now understood was between Allen and Bryan to divide the two Senatorships at the next Legislature. In the event that Bryan was not elected to the Presidency, Bryan was to represent the Democratic end and Allen the Populist end of the concern, and the two control the situation.

The most extraordinary denunciation of Bryan is taking place all over the state by both Populists and Democrats, but more especially by the Democrats, who say if Bryan comes more for Populist support than Democratic he should make his position clearer than he has.

JUDGE E. MARTIN.
 Died December 11th, 1899; Aged 79 Years, 7 Months, 23 Days.

"There is no death! What seems so in transition. This life of mortal breath, is but a suburb of the life eternal, whose portals we call death."

On a morning of Dec. 11, while the year and the century were fast numbering their few remaining days, the family and a few friends of our beloved and respected fellow citizen, Judge Martin, gathered about him and bade him a silent farewell as he passed that quiet night to the "eternal rest."

At the close of each day we find no sadness or sorrow as we say "good night" to our loved ones and the dawn to sleep, peaceful sleep, "death's counterfeits" we have no dread of this quiet passage for we are prepared to greet the dear ones so successfully. So, too, as we stood by the bedside of this good man, though tears filled the eye at the thought of the long parting, we but said "good night" as we closed his eyes in sleep, to await the resurrection morning. Thought wrought in quietness and simplicity, so important was the mission he had to fulfill that four-score years were allotted him, and well did he use the talents entrusted to his charge, in the most simple and the simplest; so are the greatest men. The history of Judge Martin's life tells of a life of usefulness in the sphere in which he moved. Ebenezer Martin was born in Bristol, Conn., April 18th, 1820, and thus lacked but four months of having reached the age of 80 years at the time of his death. He was the second of a large family of children born to Rev. Orin and Poly Martin. There were nine in all, of whom three remain but three living: John H. of California, J. D. Wayne, and Thos. at the youngest of the family who live in Minnesota. When but a child Judge Martin with his father's family, moved to Ashfield, Mass., where he resided until 1840, when they moved to Walworth Co., Wis., and made their home near Cornucopia, Wis. In 1842 he united with the Baptist church and was baptized by his father at Honey Creek, Wis. In January, 1843, he was married to Matilda Ann Lewis. To them were born seven children, three of whom are still living: Mrs. Al. M. Hartson of New York, Mrs. Nettie Sears and Chas. A. Martin of Wayne. After his marriage Judge Martin engaged in farming, first on a rented farm near his father's. He then purchased a farm at Wapuna, Fondulac Co., Wis., where he resided several years. He then sold out and afterwards purchased another farm near Baraboo, Wis. While living here he was twice elected Sheriff of Sauk Co., and served one term as deputy sheriff. He served also several terms as County Supervisor being part of the first term. Chairman of the County Board, On leaving Sauk Co., he moved to Beaver Dam, Wis., where for a time he engaged in the drug business. In 1870 he moved to Council Bluffs, Iowa, and engaged in general business, and in 1871 he was elected Justice of the Peace in the city of Council Bluffs. In December, 1881, he moved to Wayne county, Neb., and settled upon his farm near La Porte. In the fall of 1883 he was elected to the office of County Judge, which office he held continuously for 14 years. Soon after assuming the duties of his office as county judge he moved to Wayne where he continued to live till the time of his death. As County Judge he served in a most acceptable manner, and his high character and integrity were well known to all. Only those who were brought into more intimate relationship with the Judge understood his character and appreciated his sterling qualities. He was kind, gentle, peaceful, yet firmly and resolute. Who of us that have known him in his declining years would, in him, look for those qualities of daring and bravery which made him so eminent an officer while he performed the duties of sheriff in a neighboring county. While his interest and surprise have I listened as he modestly related some story of hazard which duty as Sheriff necessitated but which he met without hesitation. He was that manner of man which Lord Chesterfield said of the Duke of Devonshire, "said he 'shows his spirit by gentle words and resolute actions.'" He was as gentle as a child, yet when action was needed he was firm and fearless. His patient kindness as husband and father only those who know him can appreciate. He has left in the home that now misses his kindly voice and gentle presence. His goodness, his faithfulness as a friend, his fidelity to duty will always be remembered by those who were fortunate enough to be acquainted with his acquaintances. He was generous and benevolent, yet his kindly acts were not paraded before the eyes of his fellows. "True goodness is like the glow-worm in this, that it shines most when no one except those of Heaven, are upon it."

His generous care and sympathy for those who needed sympathy was tenderly shown by the following circumstance: Though he had reared a large family of children, the death of a daughter he took into his home her orphaned baby and with the tender and patient care of a father he fostered the child and youth as his own until he reached the years of manhood. When the tender age of two years or fellow townsman, E. H. Alexander, has known no other home than that of his grandfather. But it was in the closing years of his life when those noble traits of character which marked the man, were most noticeably his patience, his fortitude, his endurance of suffering without complaint, his strict performance of duty under the most trying circumstances.

"Two-score years and ten were allotted to me," said he by reason of strength," said the Psalmist, "they be fourscore years, yet is their strength labor and sorrow; for it is soon cut off, and we fly away as a chaff of the wind." These words fulfilled in the life of our dear friend. The last 10 or 15 years of his life were years of patient suffering. As he, his friends and neighbors, saw him walk to his office in the old court house and back to his home, they were struck and year after year we met his kindly face and exchanged cheerful greetings with him upon the street; as we beheld him with reverential devotion each evening in the home where he was his own, few of us knew of the sleepless nights of suffering he was patiently enduring. Week after week and year passed and he quietly and uncomplainingly bore the burden of his illness. There were times when the pain would seem to be almost unbearable, but he would turn his face to the wall and again engage in his business here.
