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# RARE PORTRAIT OF LINCOLN.



Many who looked on the face of Abraham Lincoln in those lively days when the great President was merely a backwoods campaigner, speaking from the same stump with Stephen A. Douglas, agree that the likeness published here is a true one. It is the property of Henry Kuhlman of St. Louis. Of his history he says: "In 1860 I saw the picture, a life-size crayon, hanging in a rooming house in St. Louis. I was a young man at the time, and I asked a woman who was in the store whose picture it might be, but she did not know. I bought it for fifty cents, took it home, framed it, and only found out a year or two later that it represented Lincoln. Although an old-fashioned Democrat, uncompromisingly, I kept the picture in its place and learned from day to day to love the man, and when, in 1863, Lincoln ordered a draft, because the patriot and all did not, I became a naturalized citizen, probably the only one in St. Louis in that remarkable year. A year ago I saw the picture, but did not succeed. Mr. Kidd, in Springfield, thought that some one had probably made the picture while Lincoln pleaded a case in court, saying that Lincoln had a habit of running his fingers through his hair. I have communications from men who stand high—men who knew Lincoln well—who had never seen the picture before, but declared it the best they had ever seen when I sent them copies. I have since then distributed among my friends 500 copies of the picture, and they all fully appreciate the value of it."

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# COLLECTS BILLS FOR DOCTORS.

Man Whose Business It Is to Make Patients Pay Promptly.

There was nothing remarkable about the appearance of the man. Nevertheless, one of the party felt himself called upon to say that he probably had the most curious job of anybody in the city. "He's a business manager for doctors," he explained.

"There's nothing new to that," was the remark of the members of the party. "I know of a number of physicians and dentists who pay a certain sum each month to have their bills made out for them. The man so employed goes to their offices for a day or two, writes up their bills, makes out their bills, and mails them. Sometimes three or four doctors having offices in the same building will employ one man among them for this purpose. Members of these professions are notoriously poor business men, and some of them lose about half their time owing to that fact."

"But this man," insisted the first speaker, "does even more than that. He has taken up that idea and carried it to its logical conclusion. He has an office of his own, and all bills are payable at that office. He takes the bills of his clients as his own office makes out the bills and collects the money. Of course he has to be a man of standing, in whom the professional man has some confidence, but he is all of that, and he does just the work a physician needs to have done. For some reason a doctor's bill is the very last that most men pay. The average citizen will pay his grocer or his butcher or any other tradesman with reasonable promptness, but will let his doctor wait."

"Now, this young man of whom I am speaking simply conducts the financial part of the doctor's business on business principles. He does just as much, as a merchant would do and no more. The first bill is followed by another and another, and he receives no attention he goes out as a collector and presents the third in person. But he says, the mere fact of the bills being sent out on time and followed up with reasonable promptness, is largely responsible for their own trouble in getting paid for their services. The young man is not a lawyer, and he never sues for the money. He does not pose as a bad-debt collector, never writes threatening letters, and never resorts to bluffing tactics. Yet, as I say, he has been most successful and has proved himself worth far more to his clients than they have to pay for having their business affairs methodically conducted. After he is through, if he has failed to get the money, it rests with the doctor to decide whether he wants the bill put into the hands of a lawyer, and he has the further satisfaction of finding out in a much shorter time than ever before just what bad debts he has on his books."—Chicago Inter Ocean.
