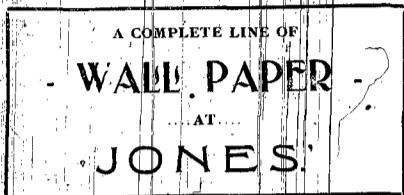

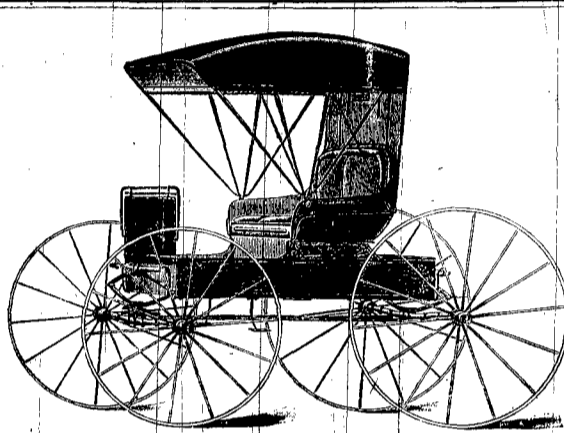

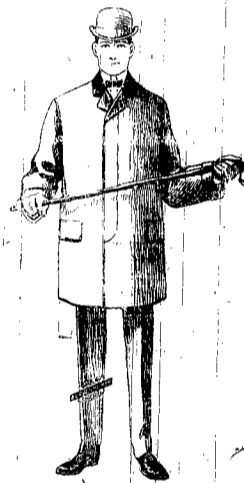

ANNUAL MEETING

The North Nebraska Teachers Association convened here yesterday afternoon in annual session, and will be in session until Saturday. All trains arriving yesterday brought in large delegations; regardless of the inclement weather, until there were about 250 in the city last night. The trains arriving this morning brought in many more and it is expected that by night not less than 400 teachers will be present. The reception committee met all delegations at the train and at once provided them with lodging and otherwise looked after their welfare, and it is to be hoped that the visit of the teachers to Wayne will be a most profitable and pleasant one.

The first session was held at the court house yesterday afternoon at 2:30, and was called to order by President O'Connor of Norfolk. After the necessary preliminary proceedings had been had, an interesting paper on "The requirements necessary to graduate from High School," was read by Miss Eoline Clark, which brought forth considerable discussion. During the afternoon a High School Declamatory Association was formed, and the following officers elected for the ensuing year: President, Prof. Miller of Randolph; Vice-Pres., Prof. Seykora of South Omaha; Secretary, Superintendent, Laird of Fremont. An adjournment was then taken until 9:00 o'clock this morning.

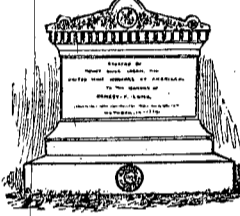

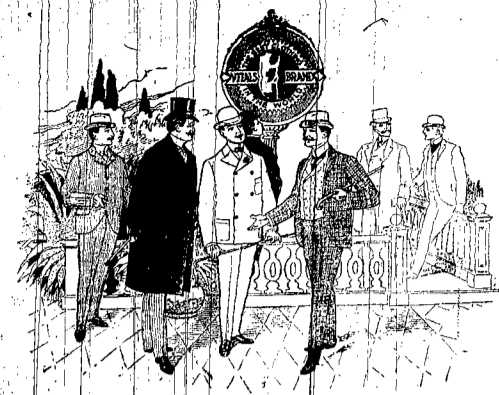

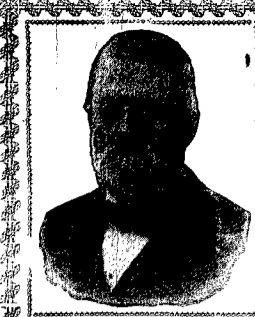
