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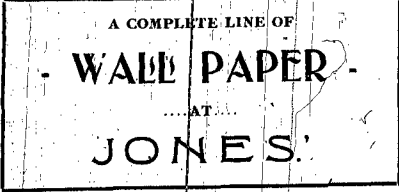

A Peculiar Atmospheric Condition.  
Our people noticed a peculiar circumstance last Friday morning between seven and seven thirty o'clock. The air suddenly became as hot as a blast from a furnace, and was fairly suffocating in its stinkiness. The writer has experienced nothing to compare with it since the hot wind of July 23, 1894. The wind had been blowing all night from the south, but the heat from that cause was not uncomfortable nor sufficient to account for the condition in the morning. It was a little cloudy at that time, but not threatening to any extent. After perhaps a half hour the wind suddenly shifted to northwest and a breeze as cool as the other one had been blowing. It was afterward learned that it was raining at this time at Norfolk, and at about the same time Ed Reynolds, who is canvassing among the farmers in the interests of the McCormick Harvester Co., was driving along six or seven miles northwest of town when he noticed several severe whirlwinds, amounting to small cyclones, twisting around over different parts of the country in his vicinity. One of these passed directly over Ed and his rig, and he had not seen it coming and hastily lowered the top to his buggy the wind was severe enough that it would have wrecked the buggy top or tipped the rig over. The probabilities are the air had become heated and cooler air was rushing in to fill the vacuum which caused the unusual driving together of heated air. The atmosphere was in what is termed a condition of unstable equilibrium. In other words, so far as was possible at that time of day the conditions were ripe for cyclonic disturbances and the small cyclones witnessed by Mr. Reynolds were the best efforts of nature at that time of day to produce a death dealing twister. Had the same conditions existed at any time between the middle of the afternoon and dark no doubt there would have been cyclones of no mean proportions. Cyclones rarely occur before four o'clock p. m. or after eight, as not all the necessary conditions of heat, moisture etc. can be produced at any other portion of the day, hence it is fortunate the above conditions occurred in the morning. —Winslow Tribune.
