



COAL IRON AND TIN, SUN POWER IN WELL DIGGING Machine for Making the Heat of the Sunf Pump Water.

Many inventors have experimented with the sun's heat, with various objects in view, and some innye succeed, at making it produce steam and electric power, but not to much profit. Now, however, it appears that William Calver of Washington has invented a machine for doing practical work in


