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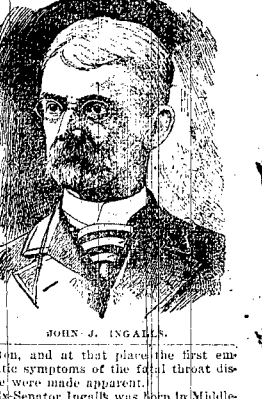
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JOHN J. INGALLS.

He was graduated from Williams College in 1855, and received the degree of LL. D. in 1874.

He was admitted to the bar in 1857 and removed to Kansas in October, 1858.

He was a delegate to the World's anti-constitutional convention in 1870, secretary of the territorial council in 1880, secretary of the State Senate in 1881, member of the State Senate of Kansas from 1882 to 1885, and member of the United States Senate from 1885 to 1891.

He was elected to the United States Senate from Kansas as a Republican in 1891.

He died on August 15, 1894, at his home in Kansas.

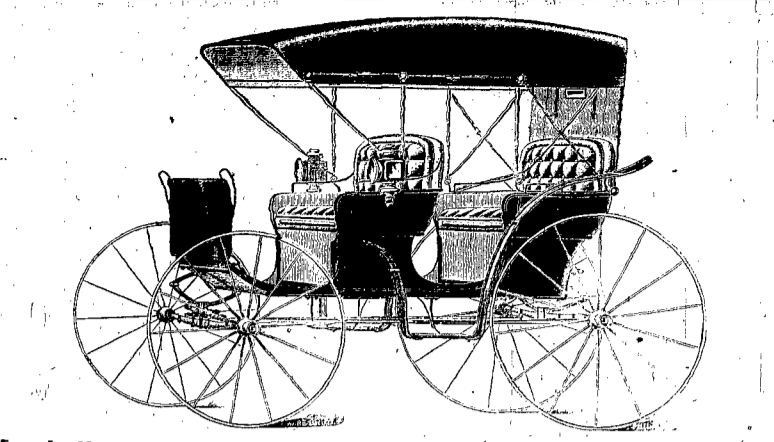
