TERMS AGREED UPON.

UNDERSTANDING REACHED ON CHINESE QUESTION.

Compromise is Made—Conferences Are to Begin Soon—Inability of Court to Indict Death Penalty Recognized—Provisions Regarding Indemnity.

The acute phase of the crisis in the Chinese negotiations was passed Wednesday, when all the interested nations reached a harmonious agreement in regard to the demands to be made on the Chinese government, to which assent must be given before formal peace negotiations can begin. Instructions were given to the Chinese government, to which assent must be given before formal peace negotiations can begin.

As the result of exchanges within the week Germany, it is understood, has come around to this view that the Chinese government, which is charged by the treaty with the duty of punishing the murderers of those who were held responsible for the murder of the American sailors.

As for indemnity, the agreement contains the provision that the Chinese government shall acknowledge liability for injuries to governments, corporations and persons, and agree to pay damages, including all expenses, to the fixed proportion of each claimer as the power plenipotentiary of the United States may determine. This provision is not fixed nor is any limit of indemnity named.

All the other demands heretofore adopted by the ministers are included in the agreement, with no material modifications. These embrace the proposals of Secretary Root and the more radical being suggested from Berlin.

PULPIT AND PREACHER

A new convent has just been dedicated to the Carmelite nuns at Thibodaux, Louisiana. The Sunday school of the Methodist denomination in the country have given nearly \$200,000 to foreign missions.

The Rev. Fred W. C. Meyer of New Haven, Conn., has been named pastor of the First Christian Baptist Church of Milwaukee, Wis.

The Rev. George J. Perin, pastor of the Every Day Universalist Church in Boston, has accepted the invitation of his denomination to deliver the address before the board of the cause of Universalism in America.

OLEO BILL WINS OUT.

Grand Measure Making Colored Butter a Crime—The bill has passed by a vote of 198 to 92.

The bill as passed makes all articles made of adulterated butter, imitation butter or imitation cheese transported into any State or territory for consumption or sale subject to the police power of such State or territory.

The bill increases the tax on oleomargarine colored in imitation of butter from 2 to 10 cents a pound and decreases the tax on oleomargarine uncolored from 2 cents to 1 cent.

WARSHIP BIDS OPEN.

Navy Department Has Estimated for Bid to Buy 12 Cruisers.

Bids have been opened in the Navy Department for the construction of five new battleships and six armored cruisers, aggregating a total displacement of 154,000 tons, and comprising the largest commitment of material for the navy ever contracted for by the United States.

STRIKES THE CANTEN.

House Embodies Prohibition Amendment in Army Bill.

The army bill as passed by the House embodies an amendment for the abolition of the army canteen. Representative Fitzgerald (Mass.) attempted to have the amendment broadened so as to prohibit the sale of intoxicating liquors on government property.

REAPPORTIONMENT FIGHT IS ON.

How the New Census May Affect Representatives in Congress.

A bill has been introduced by Representative Crane (Ind.) making an apportionment of Representatives in Congress under the census of 1900.

Hears President's Message on Monday.

Very Busy Session Looked For on Account of Many Important Legislative Measures to Be Acted Upon Before March 4 Next.

Washington correspondence. The second session of the Forty-sixth Congress convened Monday at noon. The President's annual message was read, and the Senate and House then adjourned out of respect for the memory of Senator Davis of Minnesota.

President McKinley's annual message to Congress was presented immediately upon the assembling of Congress at noon. It had been planned to withhold the message until after the House adjourned on Monday as a mark of respect for the late Senator Davis and Gen. Grant.

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REPORT OF SECRETARY ROOT.

The annual report of Secretary Root, made public Monday, is interesting, owing to the vast number of subjects considered. He details the trend of events in the Philippines, Cuba, Porto Rico, China, and elsewhere.

Mercer went so far and caused such a remarkable sensation that President Taft was finally obliged to order him to stop his speech in dread that he might repeat important state secrets.

GAGE MAKES REPORT.

Secretary Presents an Exhaustive Report on the Treasury.

Secretary of the Treasury Lyndon J. Gage on Tuesday submitted to Congress his annual report. The report shows that the revenues of the government from all sources for the year ended June 30, 1900, were \$909,595,313.18.

Expenditures for the same period aggregated \$700,098,373, including \$140,877,310 for pensions; \$134,774,707.78 for the military establishment, including rivers and harbors, forts, arsenals, sea coast defenses and the war in the Philippines; \$25,153,077.72 for naval establishment; and \$198,542,417.97 for the civil establishment.

DEATH IN EXPLOSION.

NORTHWESTERN POWER HOUSE IN CHICAGO WRECKED.

Five Persons Are Killed and Twenty More Injured—Killing Boiler Strikes Coach of an Outgoing Train—Darkness Covers the Scene.

With a mighty rush and roar a boiler in the power house of the Chicago and Northwestern Railway at Kinzie and Kingsbury streets, Chicago, exploded at 5 o'clock Monday afternoon, killing five people and injuring a score or more.

The explosion was so severe that it shook the surrounding buildings, the concussion breaking many windows. The power house is a complete wreck. Only portions of the east and south walls are standing.
