CHRISTMAS DOINGS

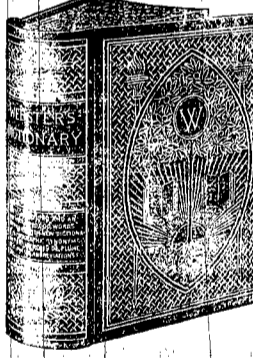

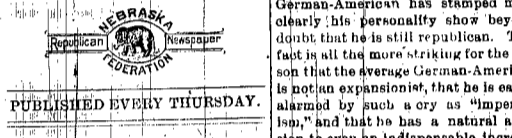

The Official Figures. According to complete official returns from all the states as gathered by the New York Times, the total vote cast at the recent election was 13,677,299. Of this McKinley received 7,217,077 and Bryan 6,357,453. Woolley, prohibitionist, received so far as reported 207,363; Barker, millionaire of the road, 18,011; Dohy, social democrat, 94,552; and Maloney, social labor, 33,450. McKinley's plurality, according to the figures of the Times, was 879,824; McKinley's majority was 108,165.

These figures show that McKinley received 115,414 more votes than in '90, while Bryan received 115,494 less than in the election of four years ago. The net increase recorded in the total vote the figures of 1896 was only 29,841. Increases reported in twenty-five states and decreases in twenty. In general good increases are shown in the vote cast by the northern states, but for the most part, they are offset by a falling off in the vote of the southern states. Texas leads the states showing a reduction in the total vote, while Tennessee, Alabama, Louisiana, North Carolina, Arkansas, Virginia are all well toward the top of the same list. In the north Pennsylvania and Minnesota show a falling off in the total vote.

The republicans made their most notable gains in the west, middle west and north-west. Note some of the gains: Colorado, 67,000; Utah, 35,000; Washington, 18,000; Wyoming, 4,000; Nevada, 2,000; Idaho, 21,000; California, 18,000; Kansas, 25,000; Montana, 15,000; South Dakota, 13,000; North Dakota, 9,000, and last but not least Nebraska, 19,000.

The gratifying feature from a republican point of view is that that party made its greatest gains in the debatable territory, where the political battle was waged the fiercest. The falling of recorded was in surely republican territory where there was some excuse for the existence of apathy. The democrats may console themselves with the same reflection only in regard to the losses in the south.

While the returns for the prohibition ticket are not given as complete, it is apparent that Mr. Woolley's anticipations of receiving a half million votes have been discounted by at least 80 per cent.—Journal.

The Boers in South Africa have again begun to make warfare interesting for Great Britain.

The odds at West Point evidently have some hot times at stated intervals. Times that would lay any old foot ball game on the gridiron to the shade.

The army bill has been passed and provides that the maximum standing of the U. S. Army shall not exceed 100,000 and this number will only be maintained in case of emergency.

The Bee says that "the Cuddey family has had \$35,000 worth of space in the newspapers of the country," but the newspapers have not had any of the yellow fluents dropped by the roadside.

The European papers do not approve of the American policy in the China question but through recent developments those nations have concluded that your Uncle Samuel was about right, and signed the joint note.

Why the German-American Vote Remains for the Most Part Republican. Returns from the State on which the German-American has stamped most clearly his personality show beyond doubt that he is still republican. This fact is all the more striking for the reason that the average German-American is not an expansionist, that he is easily alarmed by such a cry as "Imperialism," and that he has a natural aversion to even an indispensable increase in a standing army.

Why, then, did the average German-American choose to remain a Republican? Simply because of his practical experience or knowledge of German history. He realized that only under the policy of Protection was his land likely to continue prosperous. He had in mind, in fact, that miracle of Protection—the German industrial empire of today.

The Franco-Prussian war, with the resulting unification of Germany, gave prodigious stimulus to German trade and industry. But practical Free-Trade was then the policy of the German Government. After a few years of apparent prosperity, the crash came, just as disaster befell the United States under the low tariff policy of Cleveland. German factories were idle, and the country was filled with English goods. Bismarck quickly saw the remedy and his Cobdenite notions vanished.

The speech from the throne of the Reichstag in 1875 frankly announced "the duty to adopt measures to preserve the German market to national production so far as consistent with the general interest. Our customs legislation, it said, will accordingly revert to the tried-principle upon which the prosperous career of the Zollverein rested for nearly a half century, but which has been deserted in important particulars in our mercantile policy since 1866."

Bismarck bluntly declared a few months later: "One thing is clear, that through the wide open doors of the import trade the German market has been made mere storage room for other country's over production. Long enough has the German market been monopolized by foreign wares instead of being reserved for native industry."

The Reichstag "referred the engine" and adopted the Protection policy. The economic revolution in Germany since that time is one of the most notable facts in recent history. German factories now make the goods used by Germans not only alone, but are supplying an enormous and constantly increasing foreign demand. The production of coal, raising from less than 32,000,000 tons in 1870 to 101,022,000 tons in 1899, shows Germany's industrial progress. The population, in spite of large emigration to this and other countries, has increased more than 30 per cent. Hamburg is now the second port in Europe, ranking next to London. Since 1870 the German mercantile marine has been multiplied in tonnage fifteen times. The Hamburg-American Company, which began in 1847 with a capital of \$112,000 now has a capital of 16,200,000, and sends its ships all over the world. Its latest vessel is the record breaking "Deutschland." German merchants, and German goods are going into every market of the earth.

While undoubtedly other influences have contributed to Germany's industrial and mercantile advancement, these amazing results would never have been obtained but for its policy of Protection. Bismarck was a practical and constructive statesman, and no Democrat. The average German-American to-day, though no Bismarck is also practical and constructive, and therefore of him, too, can it be said truthfully: "He is no Democrat."—Chicago Inter-Ocean.

CHALDEAN EXPLORATION.
A Long Series of Surprises During the Last Four Decades.
Scientists in charge of the proposed expedition to excavate the sites of the Chaldees and other ancient Babylonian cities are making great efforts to awaken further interest in the plan and to complete the fund necessary to begin the work.
Excavations in the ruins of cities of ancient Babylonia have given the world a long series of surprises during the past few decades. It was a surprise in 1848 when the French 200 rooms and covering twenty-five acres of ground, covered in a mound north of Nineveh. The beautiful bas-reliefs which lined the walls and the carved stone frieze, speak of the magnificence of the palace. Another surprise came when the scholars read in the inscriptions which were found in the ruins that the ancient builder was the Assyrian King who captured Sennacherib and took captive ten of the Hebrew tribes.
Again the world was surprised when among the clay tablets from the great library taken from a palace at Nineveh one was found containing a story of the flood, another the story of the creation of the world, similar to the Biblical story. Still another surprise came when the palaces of five Kings of Assyria who are mentioned by name in the Bible were discovered and found to contain records of the Assyrian relations with the Hebrews supplementing the historical portions of the Old Testament.
A few years ago, when it was still generally supposed that the world was created about 6,000 years ago, it was a surprise to find at Nineveh records of a developed civilization far earlier than that age.
