Fire at Stallsmith's.

Last Thursday night many of our citizens noticed on the sky, to the south, the reflection of a fire. The next day it was learned that the farm residence of J. B. Stallsmith, together with nearly all of its contents including clothing, was destroyed by fire. The family was eating supper at the time the fire was discovered which started, it is supposed from a defective flue in the upper story of the building, although it is not known how it caught, but the little daughter spoke of smelling something burning. Mr. Stallsmith opened the door to the stairway leading to the second floor and discovered the upper room full of smoke. Taking a bucket of water he went up stairs but owing to the density of the smoke, was unable to get to the fire and before anything could be accomplished the fire had gained such headway that all attempts to extinguish it had to be given up. A few things were removed from the building which was burned to the ground. The family stayed at the home of Mr. Stallsmith's son, Henry, who resided near by, where they will remain until a new building is erected. There was \$400 insurance on the property but Mr. Stallsmith's loss aside from this was considerable. It is especially severe counting at this time of year. A wagon load of bed clothing was sent to the family by David Cunningham, who always finds it pleasant to relieve people in distress.

The Nebraska State Legislature convened Tuesday and began the new year in a happy mood, as all difficulties had been settled the night before in the republican caucus, and when the hour arrived for convening everything moved like clock work and with harmony. J. J. McCarthy of Ponca, had been a prominent candidate for speaker in the House, but was elected President of the republican caucus. W. G. Sears of Burt county, was elected speaker of the House; John Wall, Arcadia, chief clerk; A. D. Gilmore, Auburn, first assistant; C. E. Sandall, York, third assistant; H. S. Wethersell, Alma, fourth assistant; A. Wilsey, Frontier county, Sergeant-at-Arms; J. H. Fresson, Milford, Chaplain; F. L. Miller, Doorkeeper; E. D. Preston, Hamilton county, Postmaster. 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CHINATO PAY DEARLY

JOINT NOTE OF THE ALLIED POWERS SUBMITTED.

Severe Terms of Reparation Imposed on the Empire—Indemnities Amounting to Two Hundred Millions to be Paid in Favor of Wounded Victims.

The joint note to China was signed in London by the foreign ministers of the United States, Great Britain, France, Italy, Japan, Belgium, and the Netherlands.

The note demands that the Chinese government should be held responsible for the expenses of the war, and that it should be held liable for the cost of the wounded and the dead.

REPORTS ON CROPS OF 1900.

Figures of Department of Agriculture Show Good Conditions.

The statisticians of the Department of Agriculture estimate that the United States crop of 1900 will be 22,222,730 bushels of wheat, 105,385 acres, and the average yield per acre 22.29 bushels.

The winter wheat crop is estimated to be 17,224,096 bushels, the area actually harvested being 10,235,897 acres for the winter crop, and 10,235,897 acres in the fall.

The newly seeded area of winter wheat is estimated at 30,285,054 acres. While this acreage is slightly greater than that of the fall of 1899, as estimated at the time, it is 600,555 acres less than the area that was actually sown, the discrepancy being due to that remarkably rapid development of winter wheat growing in Nebraska with which as before stated, the department's reports had failed to reckon.

A comparison of the newly seeded acreage with that of the fall of 1899 shows that of the eleven States and territories that sowed 1,000,000 acres or upward with winter wheat one year ago, Pennsylvania, Missouri, Kansas, California and Oklahoma report an increase of 1,500,000, 1,200,000, 1,000,000, 900,000, and 800,000, respectively, a decrease of 1,780,000 acres.

The production of corn in 1900 is estimated at 2,105,705,735 bushels, or 49,425,180 bushels per acre, buckwheat, 23,949,927 bushels, buckwheat, 23,949,927 bushels, potatoes, 210,924,897 bushels, and hay, 50,110,906 tons.

The crop of 1900 was the one of our largest ever gathered, while the one that has just been harvested, on the other hand, the barley and rye crops are the smallest, with one exception, in fact, since 1882, and the hay crop the smallest, with one exception, since 1888.

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THE SUBSIDY BILL.

SENATOR FRYE EXPLAINS BENEFITS OF THE MEASURE.
