

In Minnesota row the man found guilty of failing to provide for his wife is pinished as a felon. A man just convicted in Minnespolit—the first under the new law—received asentence of 30 days in the work house although he might have been sent to the penitentiary for three years, that being the extreme limit of punishment for this offense.

This being the first case, the court was disposed to exhibit leniency, but hereefter, it is understood, men who desert their wives, or who neglect, evade, or shirk their duty toward their families, will not be treated with such consideration. The definquent husband could be flued or sent to jail in default of security. Now he is a felon in the sight of the law, and his sentence either to the workhouse or to the penitentiary carries with it the peniatry of hard labor. This is certainly a new departure in sociology, and the experience of Minnesots will be watched in other states with agreat deal of interest. 
