

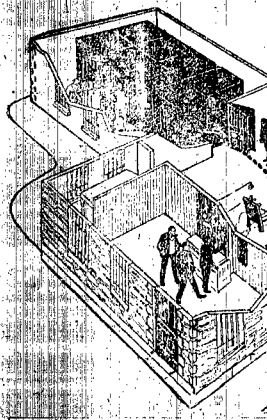

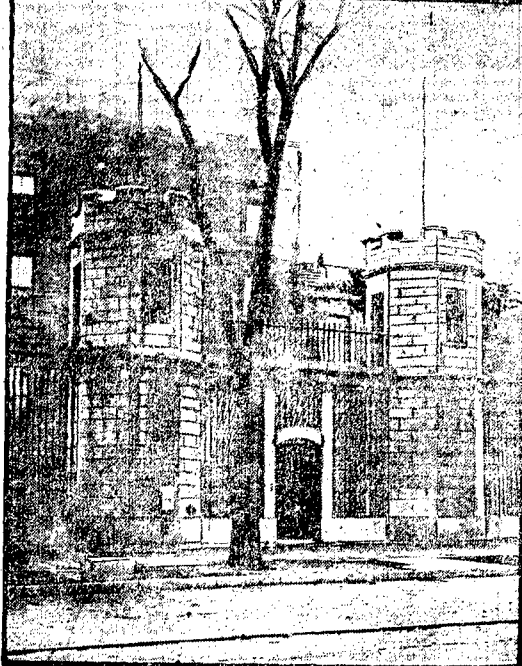


LEON C. CZOLGOSZ.

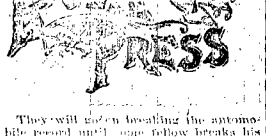
