The Roller Mills at Winside were destroyed by fire last Friday, entailing a loss of several thousand dollars, with but \$5,000 insurance. About 500 sacks of flour and considerable wheat and corn were lost. The Union Pacific R. R. also lost a car containing 1,000 bushels of corn. The mill belonged to Loud & Price, whom, we are informed, have not yet decided as to whether they will rebuild or not. It is quite a serious loss to the splendid town of Winside.

Winside To Have New Mills. A dispatch to Monday's Bee states that there are two projects for rebuilding the mill under consideration. One is the rebuilding on the old site in case of a satisfactory settlement with the insurance companies. The site may change hands and if the mill on the old site is not rebuilt, the owners of a Winside elevator will build a mill in connection with the elevator property.

A SERIOUS BLAZE.

The Engine House of the Water Works and Electric Light Plant Gutter by Fire. Loss Over \$1,000. The City without Electric Lights and City Water. Large Force at Work Rebuilding.

Wayne was visited by a serious as well as a most unfortunate fire early Tuesday morning. The two o'clock freight had just arrived and the engineer, noticing a small blaze coming out from the dome of the building, turned the engine whistle loose to give the alarm. Marshal Miner who was making his round behind the buildings caught the alarm about the same time, and firing a revolver repeatedly, ran to the firebell and gave the alarm. By the time people had reached the scene the fire had made considerable headway and the blaze and smoke in all its fury was shooting forth from the top of the building. The fire department was soon on the ground, but unfortunately it was impossible to turn on the water at the hydrant and several valuable minutes were lost, but when the water was at last turned on, the fire was soon under control, but not until the wood work had been nearly destroyed. As a result, the city will not be lighted for a few days, but it is expected that water will be supplied this week. A large force of men were set to work cleaning up the rubbish and wrecks of the fire, and the work of rebuilding was begun. Owing to the inefficiency of the alarm many people knew nothing of the fire until the next morning when they visited the ruins. The loss is between a thousand and fifteen hundred dollars, amply insured.

Marshal Miner had a man in the cooler near the building, who was released at once. George was considerably alarmed as he thought that it was the cooler that was on fire. How the fire started is a mystery, but it seemed to have started in the cupola around the boiler.

New Breeds. In looking about us at some of the older breeds we are inclined to the opinion that we already have enough breeds of poultry, and if all who breed poultry could have some one of the older and more common breeds instead of the non-descript so often seen on farms, there would be very little use for new breeds. We have a great many old breeds that are seldom seen on farms or in the yards of the fancier, such as Black Spanish, Creve-coeurs, Andalusians, Mambours or Minorcas.

The new breeds to which we refer in this article are two that have sprung up and are the result of conditions which brought about their production. The first is the Rhode Island Red, a very uneven type of fowls that have sprung up in a locality where this kind has been popular in the market. Market and other conditions have been such as to bring it into prominence and breeders have catered to this demand. This breed is a very red breed and there are as many degrees of red in it as there are colors in the rainbow. They are active and a good market fowl. For some time they were little seen outside of their native home and on Long Island, but recently they have spread all over the United States. The type is not as well established as breeders would like, but this is coming along alright. The other breed is the Buff Orpington. This is another buff breed that is said to have no advantages over the Wyandotte, but breeders are obtaining a great deal for it in hardiness, along with wonderful egg-producing powers and the ability to mature early. While we believe it to be a very excellent breed, we are not prepared to believe that it is perfect in every respect. It is a good table fowl and matures reasonably early, though the same may be said of a half dozen other fowls. There is place for these two breeds and if we could do so we would displace all the dunghill fowls that are now cumbering so many farms, with almost any breed in the Standard.—Homestead.

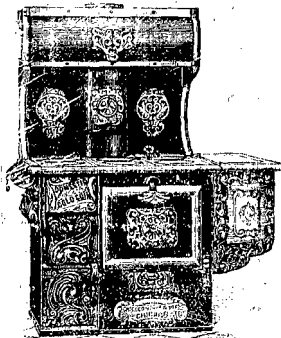

A Day at the Wayne Normal.

The editor promised the President of the Wayne Normal to spend a day with him last spring while our daughter was a student there but no opportunity presented itself; we take space in our New Year's edition to take our readers through one day's work. The train does not reach Wayne until 7:30 so you do not witness any work of the classes that recite at 7:20. In the beginning, let me say that the students study at their rooms and come to the college building to recite only.

The visitor is welcomed by Pres. J. M. Pile and taken to the class in mental arithmetic, in which difficult problems are solved quickly and accurately. No lesson is assigned in this class but all work is oral and performed in the class. This class is taught by the president whose reputation as a teacher is not limited to a state. When the 9 o'clock bell rings we go to chapel hall where about 350 students are quietly seated by the ushers; some splendid singing by Miss Stewart and the choir, is followed by devotional exercises conducted by one of the faculty; another song, a few announcements and chapel exercises are over. Review grammar class is visited and heard. Prof. Pile with a class of 60 conducts one of the most interesting classes of the day. Students have a well prepared lesson and the work makes one think for himself. This is indeed a lively class and furnishes not only thought but pleasure to all, you do not see a dull appearing or listless student but alert and watchful, quick to catch a thought or detect an error. This class is over and an introduction to Prof. Gregg follows with an invitation to witness his class in physics experiment with and discuss electricity. Here we find a teacher who knows his subjects and how to teach them. He makes thorough students who discuss the subjects with some breadth of understanding. He has been with the Wayne Normal four years and is justly popular with all the students. He comes from the great normal school at Ada, O., and has had ten years' college experience.

Five minutes are allowed for students to pass from one recitation room to another and we are in Miss Baker's rhetoric class. Composition work is discussed, an essay is read by a member of the class, its strong points as well as its weak ones are pointed out and each member of the class gives a reason for his criticisms or commendations. No error though small, is allowed to go uncorrected. This is Miss Baker's second year and her work is very strong. She teaches Latin, German and rhetoric. She is a graduate of Simpson college and spent two years as a student in Germany. The review class in geography under the direction of Miss Chase is anything but dry, she has the eye and ear of each of the large class. Questions are asked and answered with a rapidity and accuracy that would surprise a teacher in our boyhood days. Topics are assigned and students prepare the lesson not from one book but from various sources of information. The attention and order in this class as well as others is perfect. The methods used make a dry subject full of interest. Miss Chase is a very pleasant lady and is loved by all her students; she has been a teacher here five years and is very successful. Her special subjects are geography, history, and literature.

The big ball rings and there is a movement toward the large dormitory where the dining room is located. The visitor is settled with the president and family and the 175 students that board here quietly take their places at the tables and enjoy an excellent dinner of substantial food well prepared. An inspection of the kitchen, the hot water system of heating and the dormitory room only adds to the forenoon's pleasure. Everything is in the very best condition, neat, clean and systematically arranged. The dormitory rooms are well furnished and everything shows the splendid management of Mrs. Pile about the dining halls and dormitories. During

meal time, seven of the young lady students wait on the tables in a most satisfactory manner, but we are compelled to postpone the account of what we saw there until next week.—Norfolk Times Tribune.
