The petition of Clint Fry, et al, for the establishment of a public road, commencing at the northeast corner of section 29, twp. 27, Range 3, east, Wayne county, Neb., and running thence south along said section line between sections 28 and 29 for a distance of one mile, and terminating at the southeast corner of said section 29, township 27, range 3, east, having been filed in connection with the written consent of Robt. E. K. Mellor, owner of east half of section 29, and F. E. Phillips, owner of the northwest quarter of section 28, relinquishing all claims for damages by reason of establishment of said road and donating to the county, free of cash, a strip of ground 2 rods wide along said section line for said road; and also the written agreement of J. M. Lloyd, consenting to take \$75 for a strip of ground 2 rods wide along the west side of the southwest quarter of section 27, township 27, range 3, east, and waiving all claims for further damages by reason of the establishment of said road.

In the matter of the petition of Chas. Busby, et al, asking for the vacation of the public road commencing at the northwest corner of the southwest quarter of section 10, township 20, range 5, east, Wayne county, Neb., running thence east three-quarters of a mile to the old Wayne county mill. It appearing to the board upon investigation that said road is of no public benefit, and upon motion said petition is granted and said road is hereby declared vacated.

Aug. Lohberg, owner of the north half of the northeast quarter of section 10, township 27, range 2, east, Wayne county, Neb., having filed his written consent for the taking up of a strip of land four yards wide north and south, and twenty-two rods long, east and west, along the south side of the public highway, and about 90 rods west of the northeast corner of said section 10, around the bend in Dog Town creek, and offering to waive any claim for damages to said land by reason thereof, for the sum of \$125. On motion, it appearing to the Board that it is necessary to procure said land for road purposes, the proposition of said Lohberg is accepted and said land declared a part of the public road.

On motion the County Treasurer is ordered to pay to the Institute for Feeble Minded the sum of \$21.00 for the account of Andrew Bowman and the Clerk is hereby ordered to draw a warrant in favor of the County Treasurer on the county general fund for said amount.

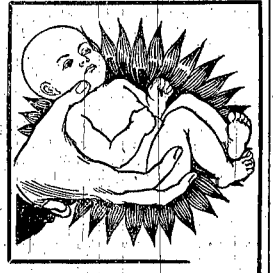
On motion the County Clerk is instructed to make a requisition on the Auditor of Public Accounts for revenue books and blanks for the year 1902.

Homestead: A few farmers will tire of improved machinery for harvesting and handling corn fodder when good crops of grain and hay come again. The old tried feeding will come on him just at a time when he feels that he must sell them, and they will be sold at a sacrifice. The day is not far distant when farmers will see the other side of the fodder problem, and they will not cut fodder in order to bridge over a shortage in feed, but it will be made the chief forage, and other kinds will be sold on markets wanting them. Why waste a large portion of the corn crop when it can easily be made a source of profit?

Rural Free Delivery Rules. Beginning February 1, 1902, rural free delivery from the Wayne, Neb., post office will be in operation, as follows: R. F. D. Route No. 1, northwest of Wayne. R. F. D. Route No. 2, southeast of Wayne. R. F. D. Route No. 3, southwest of Wayne. Maps of these routes may be consulted at the post office. Mail will only be delivered in approved boxes placed at the roadside on the route over which the carrier travels. No mail will be delivered unless an approved box is provided to receive it. Each family must have a separate box. Boxes must be purchased at the post office. They are not rented by the department. There is no expense to patrons except the cost of the box. None but approved locks may be used. Patrons are not required to use locks. Boxes must be mounted on posts so the carrier can conveniently reach them without alighting from his buggy. The top of the box must be at least five feet from the ground. Carriers are not allowed to leave their routes to deliver mail to houses standing back from the road. It will be noticed that the carriers have a long daily drive and it is hoped that the patrons will not delay them on the route. Carriers are not required to wait for people to write letters or postal cards. Stamps, postal cards, etc., may be purchased of the carrier, but it is advised that patrons keep a supply on hand. They can then put the letters they wish to mail in their boxes, already stamped, throw the signal up to show that there is something there and it will not be necessary to see the carrier personally. To insure prompt delivery all mail should be addressed R. F. D. Route No. —, Wayne, Wayne Co., Nebraska. The rate of postage on all drop or local letters carried by the R. F. D. service is 2 cents per ounce. Letters mailed bearing a single one cent stamp will in all cases be held for postage and liable to delay. Anyone stealing, destroying or defacing any mail box or mail therein is liable to fine and imprisonment. The public are requested to report all such cases. Persons now getting mail at Altona who henceforth wish to be delivered by carrier, should have it addressed R. F. D. Route No. —, Wayne, Wayne Co., Nebraska. By a co-operation of the patrons in these particulars, the efficiency of the service can be greatly increased. Please preserve these rules for future reference. Leave order for box at the post office after a list of names to get mail in box. Attend to it at once that boxes may be up and everything ready for carrier by February 1st.
