Salaries at appointment vary from \$600 to \$1200 a year with liberal promotions afterward. Politics is not considered. This affords a good opportunity for people between 16 and 35 years of age. ABOUT LENT.

Lent will commence this year at an unusually early date, February 12. In 1900 the first of Lent was sixteen days days later than it will be this year. Last year it was eight days later. This brings Easter Sunday on the 30th of March and those who have an eye to business are looking out for a supply of flowers, new dresses and Easter head-gear, will be compelled to make arrangements for an early Easter. It has been noticed that when Easter comes early the demand for new costumes is never so brisk, for the weather in March is seldom just right for the bringing out of thin and light dresses and handsome new hats. There is a strong prospect for snow storms about that time. In 1903 Easter will fall on April 12, and in 1905 the date will be April 23. Easter will not have as early a date as this year till 1910, when it will fall on March 27, and in 1913 it will fall on the earliest date in the century—March 23. Not until 1933 will Easter fall upon the latest date in the century, which is April 25.

King Is Discharged.

S. C. Journal, Jan. 29: Ed King was discharged yesterday in the police court on the charge of forgery. The defendant had been in court at every session for the past two weeks, patiently awaiting a hearing. He was accused of passing a worthless check for \$2.75 at M. E. Clancy's butcher shop. A clerk named Swanson, who cashed the check, was unable to identify King as the man who presented the check, and the case was a fizzle.

King was brought back from Kansas City on a warrant sworn out by Paul Leader, of the Leader hotel, who accused him of passing a forged check for \$18 at this hotel. The detectives who made the arrest were unable to fasten this crime on King, and when he was dismissed by the court, had him re-arrested on the Clancy check, but again failed to make a case.

Omaha Market Reports.

South Omaha, Jan. 29th, 1902. Receipts of cattle while not so heavy as last week, were quite liberal, all grades being represented about equally. On beef steers prices ruled steady to strong, and business as a rule has been active with a good demand from all the packers.

Cows and mixed stuff have also been in good demand and prices have a strong upward tendency. Values in general are from 10 to 25c. higher than last week.

For this time of the year both the supply and demand for stockers have been larger than usual. Desirable heavy grades have found ready sale at good strong prices, but on account of the liberal offerings of light and medium weights of common quality prices show a decline of 20 to 25c.

This week begins with a light run of hogs, only 18,000 for Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, with a comparison of 35,000 the same days last week. Light receipts are caused mainly by the storm and decline in prices which show a falling off from last week of from 10 to 20c.

Hog and provision values are still very high, and with receipts keeping as large as at present lower prices may be looked for.

The decline in provisions yesterday was caused by the bad break in grain as well as their own values being up to a strained pitch.

Today with 6500 hogs on this market prices are 10c lower, with a range from \$5.50 to \$6.35, the bulk \$5.50 to \$6.05. Yours very truly,

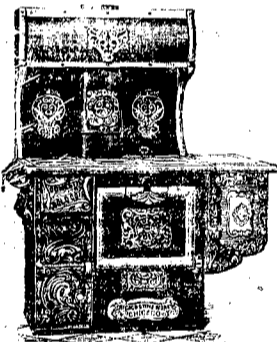
