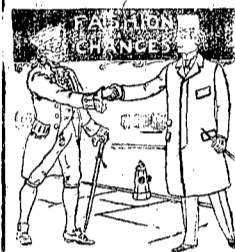

The M. & O. Ry. tried bargaining to get some of this ice for their trains, but Mr. Johanson, having only put up about 450 tons, deemed it best to save this fine product for the people of Wayne.

All the surplus corn is produced in eight states of the Union. Argentine and Hungary produce a little for export, but the world at large depends upon Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Missouri, Kansas, Nebraska, Iowa, and South Dakota for its supply. No other states grow an appreciable surplus nor can the field be extended. It is limited on the north by temperature, on the west by altitude and on the south and east by lack of fertility. Upon the corn crop depends the supply of beef, pork, mutton, wool, lard, cheese, poultry and eggs to feed and clothe the millions. The demand is rapidly increasing and prices will not soon be below the price of production. Corn is also used in the manufacture of starch, glucose, whisky and other articles of commerce.—Homestead.

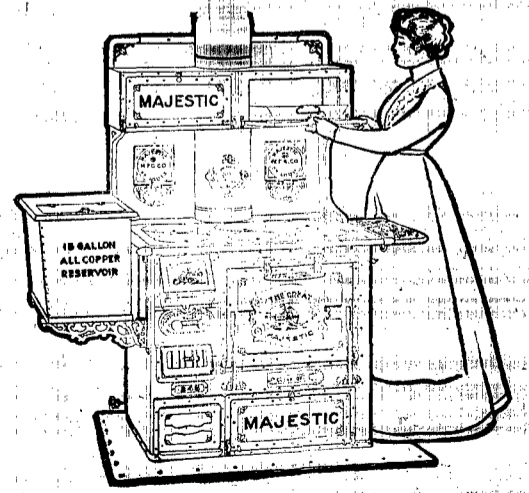

BOUGHT A KENTUCKY HILL

When King Edward VII. made an investment.

Although not one in a thousand people know it, people traveling down the Ohio River pass at Cloverport, Ky., forty miles above Owensboro, Ky., within a short distance of the place where King Edward VII. made his only extensive American investment and lost.

The site of the royal speculation is a geographical and geological freak in the southwestern part of Breckenridge county. The point in question is a hill 100 feet high, comprising about 1,000 acres, which were thrown up in past ages by some gigantic convulsion of nature. It is not an English syndicate, in possession of this hill, who has been the cause of a few millions. Geologists say this hill is not related to any other in the state. Under it are two veins of zinc. There is not another vein of this mineral within 500 miles of this Breckenridge county deposit.

Twenty-five years ago, before the discovery of petroleum, coal oil was manufactured from coal. So much zinc was generated that a lighthouse, which burned day and night, was established and became a landmark on the Ohio river fifty years ago. When zinc was discovered the value of these mines decreased.

In 1854 D. H. Yeomans, a customer appeared in London and cut a wide swath. He visited the mines by a number of Englishmen, including his royal highness, the prince of Wales, under the title of "The Breckenridge Company, Limited."

He put a vast force of men to work in the way the manager spent money was a wonder. It cost \$8 to mine a ton of coal which sold for \$7. This condition prevailed for several years. The manager of the company, an American, saved the company from absolute ruin.

When the Englishmen ever got out of the hill, it was 3,000,000 tons of coal and \$100,000 worth of lawsuits. The mines were finally abandoned two years ago. The likeness of a human face in Breckenridge county cannot call, is on exhibition at the British museum.

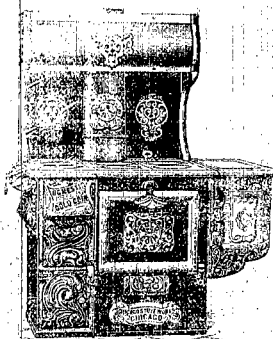

FATAL COAST STORM

BODIES WASHED ASHORE ON LONG ISLAND.

Wreckage Straws the Shore and Several Crews Have Narrow Escapes—Heroic Work of Life Saving People—Other News.

The gale which has been sweeping the coasts of Long Island and New Jersey for more than twenty-four hours and was continuing Monday night, though with abated force, has brought death and disaster to sailors and their craft. Reports of loss of life are confined at the eastern end of Long Island, where dozens of men have been washed ashore.

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DAMAGE IN MILLIONS.

Fire in Business Section of Waterbury, Conn.

The most disastrous fire in the history of Waterbury, Conn., broke out in the heart of the city shortly before 6:30 o'clock Sunday evening. A large section of the business part of the city has been wiped out, and in the high wind prevailing there is little hope of saving what still stands in that part of the business section south of Exchange place.

BIG GALE OFF SANDY HOOK.

Steamers Approaching New York Forced to Anchor in the Whirl. After sundown Sunday a wholesale gale commenced blowing at Sandy Hook.

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SWIFT RETRIBUTION.

Both the Biddles and Mrs. Soffel Shot.

Edward Biddle in jail dying, John Biddle killed with buckshot and in a precarious condition, and Mrs. Peter K. Soffel lying in the hospital with a self-inflicted bullet wound in the breast, is the sequel of the sensational escape of the Biddles from the Allegheny County jail, at West Sayre, Pa., on Thursday morning.

The scene was a snow-covered road two miles east of Prospect, Butler County, Pa., near Mount Chestnut, and the exact place was at McClure's barn, where two double team sleighs filled with eight officers, three of them Pittsburgh detectives—John Rensch, Albert Swinehart and Charles McGovern—met the two Biddles in a one-horse sleigh at the foot of a hill.

The Biddles returned to fire after jumping out of the sleigh. Mrs. Soffel's wound was through the breast. Edward Biddle was shot in the left arm, in the breast and in one leg. John Biddle was killed with buckshot in the breast and head.

When the detectives came to within about sixty yards of the fugitives they opened fire. The Biddles promptly answered with a shotgun and revolver.

Mrs. Soffel, too, stood up in the sleigh with a revolver in each hand and blazed away at her pursuers. When Ed Biddle was captured, she was about to be captured, and she fired a bullet into her breast.

The escape of the officers is miraculous. The Biddles have demonstrated on several occasions that they are good marksmen, and why they should have failed to bring down their men is a mystery.

TWO DIE AT ONCE.

Holdup Men Who Killed a Man for 25 Cents are Executed. Joseph Wade and H. H. Dalton were hanged in the county jail yard at Portland, Ore., Friday morning for the murder of James B. Morrow last November.

Wade and Dalton murdered Morrow for 25 cents. Morrow had been eating on a lady friend and was on his way home about midnight, Nov. 14, when Wade and Dalton stepped in front of him and ordered him to throw up his hands.

A SWEEPING ORDER.

Warning Issued by President to Government Employees. The president has issued the following executive order:

All officers and employees of the United States of every description are hereby forbidden, either directly or indirectly, to solicit an increase in pay or influence or attempt to influence in their own interests any legislation whatever, save through the heads of departments in or under which they serve, on penalty of dismissal from the government service.

Breaks Out of Ice Prison. The steamer Atlanta, which, with the steamer Iowa, had been imprisoned in the ice off Chicago Harbor since Wednesday night, succeeded in breaking loose at 9 o'clock Saturday morning and proceeded to Racine with its 100 passengers.

Saw Wife's Body Burned. While watching beside the dead body of his wife, Edward Owen, an aged man, at Grayling, Mich., discovered that his home was burning. He rushed from the house and they started back to rescue the body from the fire. It was too late, however, and the body was found outside in the cold and snow, with a hand and his home burned together.

Charged with Attempting Murder. Odin C. Smith, a fugitive from Perry County, Ill., was arrested at Indianapolis and handed over to Sheriff King of Frankfort, Ill., to be returned to that state for trial on the charge of attempting murder.

Answers Dutch Note. The British reply to the Dutch note in regard to bringing about peace in South Africa was dispatched Saturday to the Hague. The contents of the note are kept secret.

Get Advance in Wages. Three large glass companies in Pittsburgh outside the American Window Glass Co. have advanced their wages 10 to 15 percent. It is expected other companies not in the combine will follow suit. The advance affects 2,000 men.

PRESENT BOARD WILL STAND

Gov. Savage to Interfere with Omaha Commissioners. Gov. Savage has declined to appoint a new board of fire and police commissioners for the city of Omaha under the authority recently granted him by a decision of the supreme court.

The law bearing on the matter has been differently interpreted. Following its enactment the governor of the state made appointments. Four years ago its legality was challenged on the plea that it deprived a city of the first class of local self government.

While on the ice he fell from one of the ice chert, 50 feet, and died in a few hours. He regained consciousness long enough after he fell to give his last name, but nothing can be learned of his friends or their whereabouts.

The average York County farmer has become so prosperous that he is unable to give a horse and it frequently is necessary to auctioneer to from \$1,000 to \$3,000 there is not a horse given.

Over 50 percent of cultivated acreage in York County is in wheat which is the farmers' greatest crop. The average yield of wheat in York County is 20 bushels an acre. 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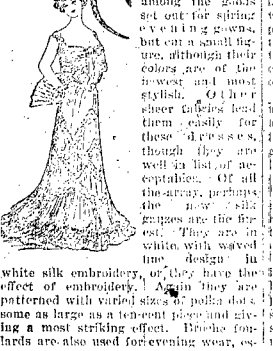

The New Copperheadism.
It is a rather dull day which does not see an outbreak of copperheadism in either branch of Congress. A few days ago all the Democratic members, except one, of the House who voted on the proposition voted against an item in a bill for the shelter and protection of the soldiers in the Philippines, Dubois, of Idaho, in the Senate, has referred to Gen. Wheaton, a life-long soldier, who is one of the best officers in the Philippines, as "probably some charity boy appointed to West Point by a senator or representative, and since then supported by the government." Patris, Teller and others in the Senate denounced Gen. Bell as being worse than Weyler on account of his recent reconcentration order. Senator Money of Mississippi, being asked what he would do with the Philippines and their inhabitants, said: "Let them go to the devil and take care of themselves, so far as the American people are concerned."

There are evidences that a systematic crusade of vilification against the administration and the army has been started by a junta in the democratic party, so as to include the republicans and defeat, if possible, all legislation for the aid of the army and the advancement of the American cause in the country's new territory. The attacks on Gen. Bell are shown by Gen. Corbin to be extravagant. Gen. Bell's aim is to protect the friendly natives from violence in the hands of the insurgents and their friends. No concentration on the Weyler or Kitchener plan, where thousands are herded together in small spaces with insufficient food and with no medical attendance, is thought of. The natives who are to be removed to other quarters will be well taken care of. The attempt is to separate the friends from the enemies of the American cause, and while the former will be protected the latter will not be injured unless caught in some overt act of hostility. An especial attempt will be made to avoid the objectionable features of the Weyler and Kitchener procedure. This is the explanation of Gen. Bell's order which is furnished at army headquarters, and, of course, it will stand against the unsupported assertions of the little band of implacables who are trying to obstruct the republican administration in Washington and to strengthen the hands of the insurgents in the Philippines.

The American people are fortunate in 1902, as they were in 1893, and the succeeding two or three years, in having an administration and a congress which has both the courage and the strength to guard American interests vigilantly and intelligently. The republicans have a majority of over twenty in the Senate, and of more than forty in the House, counting in all the elements opposed to the republican party. They have a resolute and able president. There is not the faintest reason to fear that the present breed of copperheads will have influence which their predecessors had, or to make any such trouble for the country's armies as those marplots did. The policy of extending American sovereignty over the Philippines will be carried out vigorously on the lines already laid down. All the legislation which is needed to strengthen the army in the islands and on the mainland of the United States will be enacted. The little gang of copperheads in each branch of Congress will be easily overcome. The fire in the rear on the American soldiers which was ineffective in the case of Vandaligham, Jesse D. Bright, Daniel W. Voorhees and their fellow flag fugitives will be still feebler from their weak imitations of the present day.—Globe Democrat.

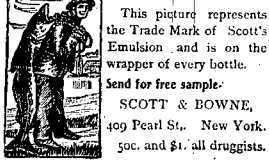
