She has always shrank from the publicity which follows successful literary work, and it was with great diffidence that she was persuaded to take up the task of preparing his autobiography. She had, however, set her heart on owning an island in Halifax harbor for a summer home, and in a spirit of fun the editor of The Journal offered to buy it for her, or to provide the means to buy it. When the work of writing appeared especially irksome Miss Keller was reminded of her desire to become a land-holder, and it spurred her on. Just before Christmas she completed the first chapter of her marvelous story, and on Christmas morning she received from her publishers a check for a good round sum. Her delight may be imagined, for this was the first money of any account which she had ever earned. "It is a fairy tale come true," she said. "Whether she will really carry out her plan to buy the island remains to be seen."

Rural Free Delivery Notice.

People who have heretofore gotten their mail at Altona and are now patronizing the Wayne Rural Free Delivery service, must have their mail addressed to Wayne. All mail addressed to Altona is only delivered at that office. Papers addressed require an additional prepayment of postage before they can be delivered by the Wayne R. F. D. service. Notify your papers to change the address.

The rules inside Rural Free Delivery mail boxes are to be taken out and retained by the box owner. An understanding of these rules will in many cases save delay to your mail. Study the rates of postage; short paid mail or other than letters is in all cases held for postage.

The Board of Health has ruled that all effects brought away from a house under quarantine must be thoroughly disinfected. This applies to letters placed in boxes for mailing. Unless such mail is thoroughly disinfected the carriers are instructed not to take it out of the box. Violations of this rule are subject to \$25 fine.

Is the House a Deliberative Body.

The House of Representatives on Thursday adopted, without debate a resolution so to amend the constitution as to provide for the election of Senators by a direct vote of the people. This proposition, of great import to the American people, received no more consideration than a bill to establish a new postal route in Indian territory. The House voted, without protest from any member, to impeach the wisdom of the fathers of the republic, who provided in the Constitution the best legislative system in the world.

In the last 100 years other nations have tried many experiments in legislative organization, but no experiment has stood the test of experience in popular government as has our own plan of a Senate elected in a way to remove it as far as possible from the influence of popular clamor, and to make it as independent of the lower house as possible.

If Senators were elected as members of the House, we should have practically but one legislative body. The framers of the Constitution realized the dangers of government by one House of Parliament, and to set up the Senate as a bulwark against hasty legislation based on popular impulse, enthusiasm, or resentment.

All the members of the house understand this. Probably not one fourth of them favor the proposition to amend the Constitution regarding the election of Senators, but as there is agitation in favor of such an amendment, and as many Democrats and Republicans representing close districts do not care to antagonize the Populists or socialist element that is advocating such a change, Congressmen pass the proposition on to the Senate feeling sure that it will be repudiated by that body.

This illustrates at once the advantage of a Senate not elected by a direct vote, and the disinclination of the House elected by direct vote to assume responsibility for action on important questions. It illustrates also the quality of present leadership in the House. When the House came to consider a Philippine tariff bill, one of the most important measures to be passed upon by this Congress, there was a hasty vote under the dictation of the House machine, and the whole question was referred to the Senate. On the question of Cuban reciprocity, a hailing, huckstering policy has been pursued, and the people are forced to look to the Senate to save Cuba and do justice to the Philippines. The present managers of the House manage their machine on the plans laid out by Mr. Reed, but the machine is without Mr. Reed's brains, and a Reed machine without Reed brains to move it is a poor piece of work, as recent dispatches from Washington plainly prove.—Inter Ocean.

A DISCARDED REMEDY.

No Longer Proposed to Remove the Tar-iff from Trust-Made Articles.

A year ago those who were crying out against the combination of plants under one company as trusts demanded that the Tariff be reduced or abolished on goods manufactured by such combinations.
 Doubtless they have discovered the absurdity of their demand, since they have ceased to make it. It may have occurred to them that, as all manufacturing establishments exist under corporation laws, it would be difficult to draw the line between those which should be regarded as trusts and whose products should be put on the free list, and those which were not trusts and should continue to enjoy the benefit of the Protection afforded by the tariff.

Now their purpose, so far as it is expressed, is to apply the free list to such corporations as sell their goods lower in Europe than they do at home.

The Standard Oil Company, to crush out foreign competitors, has sold its products in Europe cheaper than at home. This method of disposing of a surplus has been practiced by British manufacturers for years.

It was openly declared by British iron makers that before the Walker revenue tariff of 1845 they sold iron at a loss in the United States to prevent the growth of the industry here. Thus Free-Traders sold their goods below cost for a season to sustain their monopoly in the world's iron industry.
 The United States Steel Corporation sell steel billets in Liverpool lower than in New Now from time to time to get rid of a surplus incident to the continuous raising of their tens of thousands of men.

The same is true of many other manufacturers. It is probable that other merchandise is sold lower in Europe than at home simply to prevent a glut at home.

It is often remarked that those who declare that the American tariff is the mother of trusts ignore the fact that Great Britain was filled with real trusts before one was thought of in this country. For years actual trusts have controlled the British markets for goods which were admitted free of duty. In this case free trade may be charged with being the mother of trusts.—Trenton Gazette.
