All drop or local letters addressed to persons living on R. F. D. Routes require postage to be prepaid at the rate of two cents per ounce. Many letters mailed with a one cent stamp are delayed from one to three days.

The Nebraska game law reads that the open season for wild ducks, geese, brants, swans, cranes and game water fowls shall begin September 1st and end April 15th next. The open season for fish begins April 1st and the hook and line is the lawful way to fish. Nets of all kinds are barred. The licenses obtained last year must be renewed again this year. Licenses may be obtained from the county clerk for one dollar.

Rural Free Delivery Notes.

The post office department requires that all Rural Free Delivery boxes be mounted on posts so the carrier can drive up to them and easily reach them without getting out of his buggy. If on a route of sixty boxes the carrier is delayed for two minutes at each box the total delay amounts to two hours at the last end of the route. When this delay is due to an improperly put up box it is an injustice to the carrier and to the patrons on the latter part of the route. Parties having boxes near together should place them side by side and not more than 60 or 100 feet apart, never on different sides of the road, directly opposite nor on opposite corners. All boxes erected at cross roads must be on one corner. The boxes must never be located inside the ditch or on ground that is hard to drive up over in any kind of weather. In putting up boxes in winter it is not expected that patrons will in all cases put up posts, but they will fix the boxes in a convenient place for the carrier at an early date in the spring. When the boxes are not properly put up the service will be with drawn.

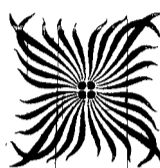

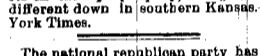

Nelson of the Hartington Herald for representative, they will have named an excellent man, one who will serve the district with credit, and who would ably represent the district in the legislature.

W. W. Young of Stanton is being favorably mentioned as a candidate for congress in the Third district, but he has not yet said his aspiration was in that direction. Mr. Young made a good record in the last session of the legislature and gained many friends who would gladly support him as the representative of this district in congress.—Norfolk News.

If Tillman is the eminent scholar polished gentleman and all around manhood that he is said to be, and if President Roosevelt is the uncouth, ill-bred, boorish, ignorant described by Tillman's friends why did the latter gentlemen so far forget his dignity, and the good name of the sovereign state of South Carolina, as to consent to dine, in fact, trestle upon dining, with the "cheap white trash" at the White House? Tillman's condescending to be entertained by Roosevelt is worse than Roosevelt's condescending to entertain Booker T. Washington of South Carolina's ignorant, intellectual and moral qualifications, and does not exaggerate the defects of the president's mind and heart.—Conservative.

The republican national platform goes no further with reciprocity than to approve it in dealing with articles that we do not produce ourselves. That is the true basis of action for Republicans. If they introduce an exception and to tariff tinkering, the end of which no one can foresee. The territorial protection of American industries is acknowledged, unquestioned, republican doctrine. Special tariff concessions to a foreign country are not republican doctrine, and never can be until the party abandons one of its original and cardinal articles of faith.

Rural Free Delivery carriers are now included in the classified service under the Civil Service laws. No dismissions will be made except for cause. All vacancies on established routes and appointments for new routes will be made from the list of eligibles established as a result of a civil service examination held at the office where the vacancy exists; provided that when a vacancy occurs on an established route the person who may have been serving as substitute carrier on the route will be selected if in other respects his qualifications are equal to those of the other eligibles. The eligible list consists of those who have passed the civil service examination—those ranking highest receive the first appointment. Additional examinations will not be held until the eligible list is exhausted. The examination requires no scholastic ability, it only being necessary for the applicant to be able to read and write. Notice of the date of holding examinations will in all cases be published in the papers and posted in the post-office.
