The provisions of the general revenue and occupation tax upon peddlers, were enacted by the legislature in the exercise of its taxing powers and are valid.

Homestead: This is the year when there should be no chances taken in the provision of seed corn. It will be an easy matter to lose one hundred dollars by trying to save ten. I don't mean by this that every man should buy his seed corn, not that, but that he should not let a few dollars be in the way of getting really good seed.

Homestead: A sixteen inch disc does better work than a twenty inch disc. There is also danger of getting them too wide. A disc should be just wide enough to take out exactly two rows of corn. That is, the disc should cover two spaces between corn rows and not disturb the corn in the rows. It should snub an extent that they will prevent the disc from doing a good job by riding the extra rows. I have observed this a number of times in working with them.

Out in Buffalo county, Inspector Mollfresh found forty-five rural mail boxes put up side by side at the Luce post office, now discontinued. It is a grand idea, and shows that the people out there are alive to the convenience of the rural free delivery. These boxes represent at least forty-five families, cut there in the country. Some of the owners go several miles for their daily mail. It is hard for some farmers to realize that it is easier to go a mile or two to a route than eight or ten miles to the post office. They get no convenience or service at the office that could not be had of the carrier and still some who live six or more miles from town do not think it worth while to put up a box.—York Times.

There has never been a more consistent and enthusiastic supporter of the United States than Theodore Roosevelt. As president of the Civil Service Commission, in 1893, he was distinguished as the foremost advocate of appointments to the civil service of the United States because of merit instead of partisan service or political expediency. The conservative believes President Roosevelt is thoroughly honest and sincere in his devotion to his principles of the merit system today as he was then. Therefore it has great confidence that he will not permit the removal of any competent, efficient and honest postmaster or other public servant simply because it is demanded by some practical politician who desires to put a friend into an official job. There is no more reason why an honest and faithful public servant should be removed to make room for a political crony than there is reason for removing a competent cashier, or an efficient teller in a bank because someone else who is a friend of one of the directors may wish his place. Long service in a public position by an honest and efficient man makes the removal more and more useful to the general public. Officers were created to facilitate the carrying on of the business of the public, and not for the purpose of exalting or remunerating private citizens. A public office is a public trust and has always been held by the best citizenship of this republic.—Conservative.
