

**DEATH OF WM. VINCENT.**

Last Thursday evening, April 10, about five o'clock Wm. Vincent, who had been ill from lung fever for several days and was convalescing when on Wednesday he was suddenly stricken with paralysis, died at his home in the east part of the city. Mr. Vincent had been afflicted some time with heart trouble but his death came as a surprise to all.

The funeral was held Sunday morning at 10 o'clock at the Presbyterian church under the supervision of the Old Fellows Lodge of this city, of which deceased was a highly respected member. Rev. Weiden of the Baptist church preached the sermon and the remains were interred in Greenwood cemetery.

Wm. Vincent was born in Houston, Texas, May 16, 1844. When he was six years of age he removed with his parents to Iowa where he lived until 1863. In 1863 he moved to Colorado where he lived two years. Then he returned to Iowa where he resided until the spring of 1884. It was then he removed to Wayne county, where he has since resided, engaging in farming and stock raising. One year ago he took up his residence in our city. At Council Bluffs, Iowa, on April 2, 1883 he was united in marriage to Miss Alberta Wicks, who for 30 years has been his companion and who has borne him six children, four of them, only two, Frank Vincent and Mrs. Griffith, remain to mourn his departure.

Deceased united with the Christian (or Disciples) church in 1867. He has been a member of years been an active and loyal member of the L. O. G. F., under whose auspices burial took place. He bore the reputation of being an honest, hard-working man.

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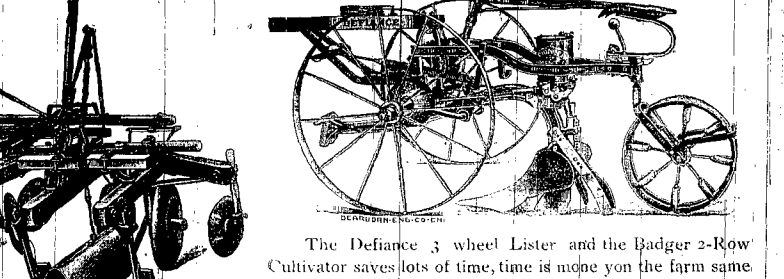

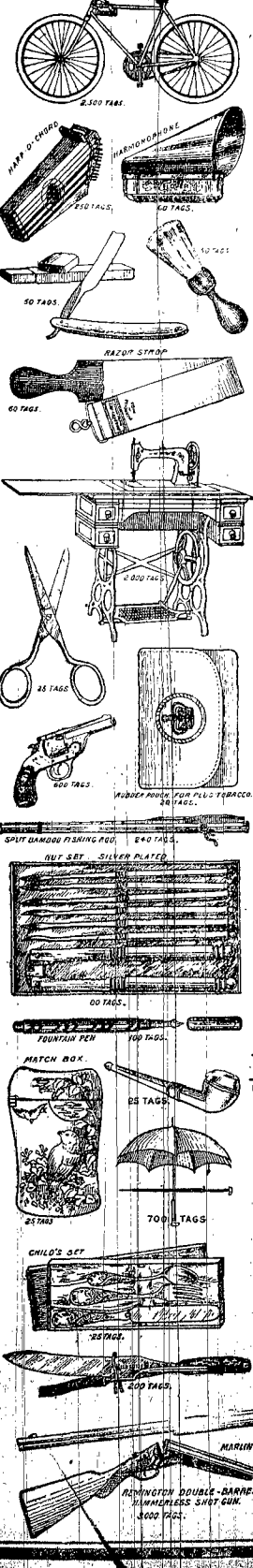

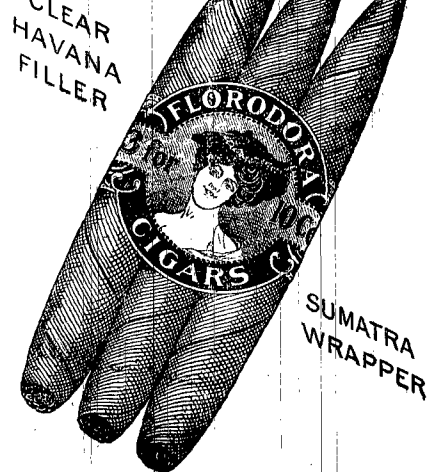
