Many Lives are Lost and Millions of Dollars Worth of Property Destroyed.

Central Illinois for a distance of 100 miles wide and 200 miles long, was tornado swept yesterday, in which many lives were lost and millions of dollars worth of property was destroyed. The wind reached a velocity of 100 miles an hour and the devastation was something frightful.
