UNIVERSITY NOTES.

Mr. Clarence T. Johnson, assistant chief of the irrigation investigations of the United States department of agriculture, on the subject of Egyptian irrigation, lectured at the university Thursday evening, Dec. 4.

Mr. Johnson commended by reviewing briefly the work of the French and English Engineers to whom the modern irrigation system of that country is due. It was noted as a significant fact that the laws and regulations under which the system is operated have been formulated by engineers and the administration of the work is in the hands of engineers. It is coming to be more and more the case everywhere that engineering skill is called into requisition at the earliest inception of industrial project and that policies in regard to the same must be given shape by experienced men. In our own country the irrigation industry is most substantially founded in those states in which laws providing for public control have been adopted and the administration has been entrusted to engineers. Nebraska was cited as a worthy instance in point.

On a map of Egypt, it was shown that the extent of the Nile Valley to which interest attaches in this connection is about the same as that of the Valley of the Platte from the Missouri River to Denver. By means of diagrams the reliability of the Nile as to stage, when compared with a number of American rivers was shown. This characteristic makes it possible for Egyptian irrigation to conform to a fixed practice.

The illustration shown were particularly fine, and covered the different methods of delivering and lifting water, some of them representing the most crude practices of the natives, while others set forth the magnificent works which have resulted from the employment of the best engineers, with a national treasury back of them.

The Assuan Dam, lately completed on the upper Nile, was shown and described in some detail. Thirty-five thousand men were at work on the dam at the time. It will back the water up the Nile for 160 miles, and will unfound water sufficient to cover nearly a million acres one foot deep, and make possible canals on the upper Nile.

The Yussuf Canal, said to be the largest in the world was shown. It carries nearly twice as much water as the food of the North Platte River.

THE PRESIDENT'S PRINCIPAL RECOMMENDATIONS.

PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT'S message to Congress is less voluminous than those of many of his predecessors, containing in full only about 12,000 words. It may be called a concise and to the point optimistic document. The President congratulates the country on the progress it has made, and he assures us that while the prosperous wave will recede and at times there will again come periods of depression, a higher plane of material well-being than ours at the present moment, and he predicts that the American people will permit of no additional retrogression.

The President in dealing with the trust question holds that corporations, and especially combinations of corporations, should be managed under public regulation. Capital, he says, has the right to combine for its own protection and for development along industrial lines, and that labor has equal rights. But that when capital has combined to such an extent, and if labor in combining interferes with the rights of others or with the welfare of the general public, such combination must be regulated by law.

The foreign relations of this country are reviewed in a very brief and formal manner. No international question is pending in which this country is vitally interested. There is not a cloud on the horizon, the President says, but he advocates provision for a thoroughly efficient navy to insure a continuance of this state of affairs.

On Cuban reciprocity the President stands precisely where his predecessor stood on this question. He favors and urges the largest possible measure of trade reciprocity and pays particular attention to the implied pledges of this government to see to it that Cuba was put upon her feet in a business as well as a political way, and not until that had been done through a measure of reciprocity will the duty of this government toward Cuba have been done.

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DIE IN HOTEL FIRE. FLAME AND SMOKE KILL FOUR. TEEN IN CHICAGO.

Victims of Horror in the Hostelry. Mostly Farmers Attending the Live Stock Show—Many Suffocated Like Rats in a Trap. Fourteen men were suffocated in an insignificant Chicago fire that broke out at 3:30 Thursday morning in the four-story European Hotel, 170 Madison Street. There were 125 guests in the hotel. The men were mostly farmers attending the live stock exposition, and it is said, if it had not been for the narrow halls, the overcrowded rooms and a failure to alarm the victims they would have been able to escape from the fire.

For half an hour after the firemen found their way into the building they stumbled across insensible forms lying on the floors and on the stairways. Although the fire was extinguished, the men and women were imprisoned there, the smoke was impenetrable and the victims were allowed to stifle to death. The victims were awakened by a blinding smoke that shut out the light in the room. It was reported that the fire was accidentally started. The hotel being renovated, and it was charged that piles of shavings were littered around some of the rooms. One of the guests said that the blaze started from a cigar thrown in the hallway on the second floor.

Farmers Look for Friends. The scene around the partly burned building, after the terrible results had become generally known throughout the city, was pathetic in the extreme. The hundreds of strangers, principally farmers from nearby States, who were in Chicago to do part in the live stock exposition at the stock yards, knew that the Lincoln Hotel was largely occupied by their friends and acquaintances, and they hurried into Madison Street and inquired anxiously as to whether their particular friend, in some instance a brother-in-law, was among the victims. Each one to make the inquiry was directed either to the county hospital or to an undertaking establishment where the bodies had been taken. At the latter place the white sheet was lifted time and again to permit the facial features to be scanned by the anxious ones.

BILLIONS IN THE FARM. Agriculture Is Convulsions in Industrial Progress. "In the industrial progress made by the United States during recent years there has been no more conspicuous feature than the growth of agriculture," says Secretary of Agriculture James Wilson in his annual report to the President. He gives figures, mainly from the last census, to prove his statement.

The amount of fixed capital invested in agriculture was \$20,000,000, or four times the amount invested in manufactures. More than half of the people of the United States live on farms, and more than a third of all the people engaged in gainful occupations work on farms. In one year the products of agriculture were valued at an aggregate value of nearly \$5,000,000,000.

American brains applied to American farms is what is causing the volume of our farm exports to continue steadily on the increase, according to the Secretary, and he sees the greatest hope for the future. He is in an unimpaired stage in all lands. The education of producers from the field, so long neglected, has recently been undertaken in earnest in the United States. Our government is doing more for the farmer than all other nations combined. The future will still further show the value of science applied to the farm.

Secretary Wilson's display of the work of his department during the past year is almost bewildering, so many fields of investigation does he have been opened up. His report is a volume of 122 pages, and there is hardly a page that does not report on at least two or three different enterprises undertaken in the search for facts that will enable agriculture to be more successfully carried on.

One of the things of aiding the farmers which the Secretary is most anxious to avail himself of is the distribution of daily weather forecasts through all the rural free delivery postal routes. Of the 10,000 routes the department has been able to send forecasts over only 5,000. The Secretary has been studying the question of an appropriation of \$100,000 is asked to extend it.

One of the recommendations of the report favors an Appalachian forest reserve. Mr. Wilson makes the startling statement that the forest lands of the United States have been reduced by 12,000,000 acres in the last century. He says further that water power of an aggregate annual rental of \$20,000,000 is being destroyed, that the land of the mountains is being washed away, and that a single year now than in ten centuries while the forests stand, and that the soil swept down is logging the Ohio, Tennessee and Mississippi rivers in a way that will be most injurious to navigation. He earnestly urges the creation of a preservation of forests on the mountains.

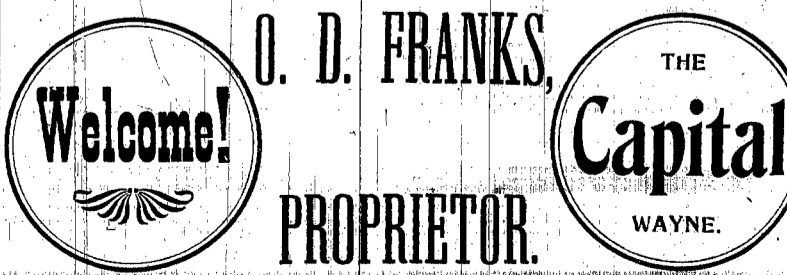

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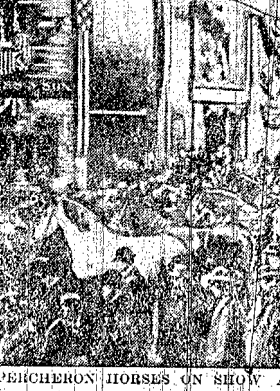
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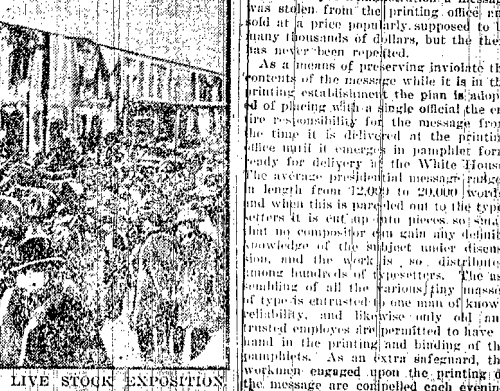
