

### LINCOLN CORRESPONDENCE.

Lincoln Correspondence.

Lincoln, Nebr. April 6, 1903.

The most important event of the past week in the legislature was the completion and signing of the new revenue bill, which is now a law, and which will take effect on the first of next October. The bill, when it reached the governor's hands, was carefully compared to see that no trickery had been employed after it's pas-age, and the next day the governor believes that under the new bill the total valuation of the state will reach \$500,000, 000, at the one fifth valuation, as compared with the \$180,000,000 under the old law. If this is the case it will necessitate much lower levies all slong the line. Some are more conservative in their figures than the governor, but nose are lower than \$300,000,000.


