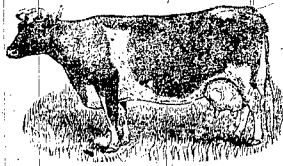


They Don't Know More Than an Old Cow.

Tuesday, May 5, dawned bright and clear on our beautiful little city, and upon the arrival of the morning trains one could plainly see that there was to be some thing going on here that day. The daily newspaper men doing their best to get a few subscriptions, the agriculturist paper representing the talking to their former friends, along with other good people, not help but remind you of the Fourth of July and the parade only was missing.

W. N. Rogers of McCook, Neb., was the efficient manager of this sale, but under the circumstances was unable to contribute any of his herd. Scott & March of Belton, Mo., contributed a long string of full-bloods. They were beautiful and looked as if their owners had a mould in which they cast their well formed animals. Their bull Gold Nugget topped the sale, selling to J. G. Von Seggern, of Wisner, Neb., for \$305. L. L. Young of Oakland, a popular stock breeder of this part of the state, had a few animals in this sale. Perhaps his stock brought the best price, on the average, for he had several very fine cows with him that sold for close to the \$300 mark.

Wm. Ernst & Son of Graft, Neb., were also heavy contributors, having some fine looking animals with them, and with as good pedigrees as you could wish for an animal of your own. Robt. Burt of Council Bluffs, and Holt Bros. of Laurel, each had a few full bloods in the sale.
