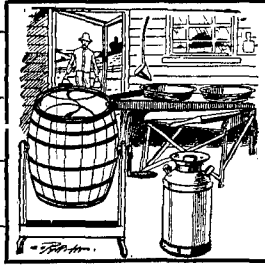

of the local contemporaries. The HERALD publishes these matters to show the difference between a man who was endeavoring to do the right thing by his competitors, and one who was looking up every little mistake that might occur in order to create a sentiment against the other.

So far as Mr. Sin Clair ordering a change in the office force, it is not true, the same as about nine-tenths of the Democrat's other claims.
