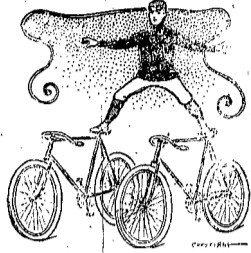

Canada.

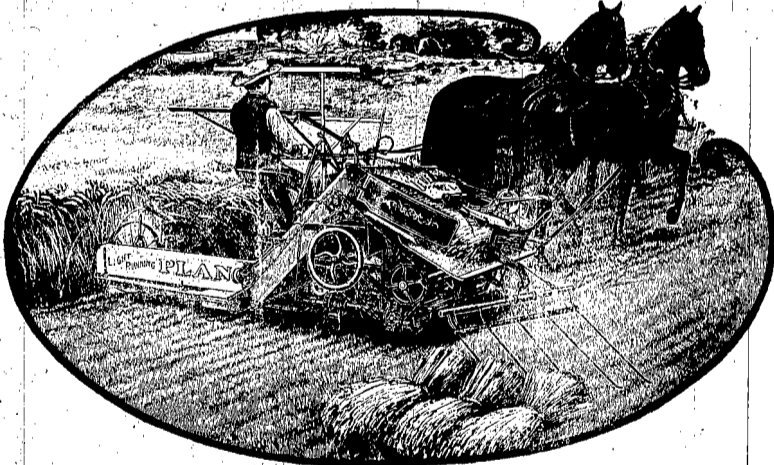
Note the card of Dr. B. McIntyre

COMMISSIONERS PROCEEDINGS.
The commissioners met as per adjournment as a Board of Equalization; all members present.

On motion the following tax levy is made on the assessed valuation of all property in Wayne county, both real and personal, for the year 1903:

County General Fund, 7 1/2 mills. County Bridge Fund, 4 mills. County Bond Fund, 1 1/2 mills. County Road Fund, 2 1/2 mills. Soldiers Relief Fund, 1/2 mill.

The Board of Education of the School District of Wayne, in the county of Wayne, and state of Nebraska, having requested a levy sufficient to raise \$9535.00 for school purposes, on motion a levy of 25 mills is hereby made on said district.
