NO CAUSE KNOWN FOR DEED.

Tuesday afternoon just a little after the arrival of the 2:00 o'clock train a rather heavy set man of the age of 30 years or more entered the north door of the Boyd hotel, approached the of fice counter and registered as George E. Weiseman, Norfolk, Nebr. He asked for a room of Landlord Thurston and stated that he wished to go to it at once, paying for it at the same time. Mr. Thurston noticed that he looked tired and gave him a gool room, No. Mr. Thurston noticed that he looked thred and gave him a cool room, No 21 on the second floor of the hotel to the east. A little while after a report like that of a pistol was heard by Mr. Thurston, but as reports of exploding fire crackers were frequently heard she gave no heed to it in particular.

Hoofingle went to the room to call him for supper, but receiving no response pushed; the door open slightly, whereupon he discovered Weiseman lying on the bed with, a revolver in his haid. Fisher nearby, and together they went to the room where they found Weiseman dead with a bullet wound in his nan dead with a bullet wound in hi man dead with a other would in his right temple, the bullet having passed entirely through his head, afterwards being picked up off the floor by Con-stable Hood. Willisms, coro-ner, was at once notified who found that the suicide had been dead some that the suitcide had been done some time, indicating that the deed had been done immediately after entering the room, and that death must have been almost instantaneous as no signs of any struggle whatever were in evi-dence.
