

We are easily a billion dollar country in our capacity to buy dollar country in our capacity we are almost a billion a country in our ability to sell. Both our production and our consumption spell unprecedented prosperity. The largest total foreign commerce of any previous year was that of 1901, \$2,310, 987,516. In 1900 it exceeded two bil-

lions for the first time in our history the total imports and exports for that year being \$2,224,000,000. Thus has the value of our international exchange waxed since the Dingley customs act of 1897. Two facts of significance as to the

effoct of the Protective Tariff stand out among these figures. These are that nearly have of our imports for this fiscal year are of material for use by domestic manufacturers; and that there is a steady increase in our ex ports of manufactured goods, as well as of foodstuffs. Statistics of imports for manufacturers are at and only for ten months or the year; but in the last of those months, April, there were 49.77 per cent. of the total. In 1909
