The levy last year was 7 1/2 mills, but this year the limit is 9 1/2 mills, and it was for this purpose that Mr. Wittler appeared before the Board and it is believed the result will be a reduction of 1/2 or one mill which would mean \$2000 or more saved to the county. While there he learned also that Wayne county was in the lead of any other county in the paying of the state tax and the amount was practically all paid for the past five years.



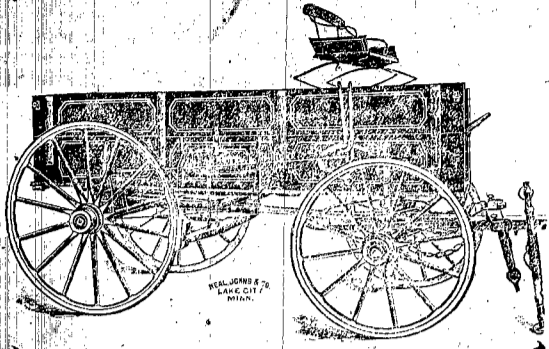

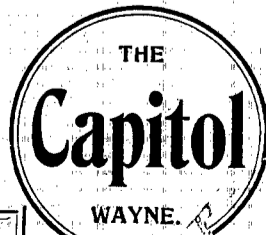
