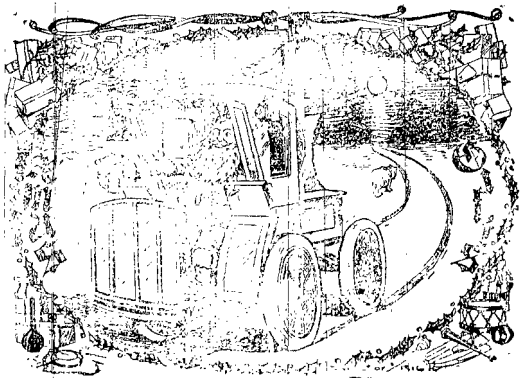

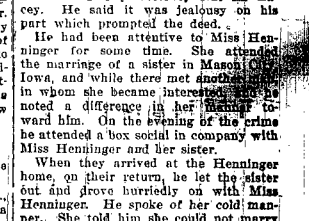

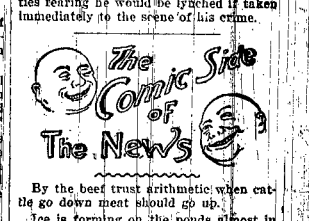

At the opening of the regular session of congress Monday, President Roosevelt's annual message was read. It is an able document and sets forth the accomplishments and needs of the government in an interesting style.

The Fremont Tribune notes that Nebraska has just achieved some glory by one of its corn-fed steers capturing the prize at a Chicago stock show, which somewhat neutralizes the shadow cast by late unpleasant experiences in high official circles of the state.

The coming Iowa legislature will be asked to make an innovation in respect to matrimonial laws. A bill will be introduced providing for a physician's certificate of examination before a marriage license can be issued. This step is taken by the Iowa society for the suppression of disease and degeneracy.

During his Thanksgiving vacation Gov. Mickey journeyed fifty miles in an open buckboard in Keya Paha county and had further experience astride a broncho, the mercury lingering below zero and icy winds whistling through his whiskers. He is probably exercising and hardening himself for the next gubernatorial contest.

In a talk with Judge Evans, of Dakota City, this week, he incidentally called our attention to the commendable fact that Wayne county has comparatively little litigation. It shows that our people are prosperous and law abiding, that if they have any differences they settle them with reason, unaided by the courts. It is evidence of a spirit of fairness, made easy by prevailing plenty and prosperity.

The human ear has become a valuable article of commerce. A Montana miner bought an ear at a big price, and the man who delivered the goods, now advertises for one to replace the severed member, which he expects to get at a figure that will leave him ahead in cash. However, this lately developed commercial value of ears opens a door to riches not altogether dependent on shrewd, speculative brains, but largely on inheritance—the quantity and quality of the article. That is why many of us can make in this new realm of money-making. We have plenty of the natural gift and can slice off and sell enough common-sense ears to supply a township and still have an adequate amount of the commodity left.

A devotionalism recurs with painful frequency in most newspaper offices. The press, like a dyspeptic stomach, has periods when it won't work right, and simultaneously the ink refuses to distribute, the rollers, hard as adamant, become particeps criminis, the type, feigning fatigue, acts as though it had been in constant use since the days of Gutenberg, and the engine, tinkered, oiled and booted, reluctantly performs its accustomed functions. These things put the brakes on the editorial thinking, and with a natural scarcity of news, the paper's issues late and short of literary fodder and subscribers are nettled accordingly. The office force frowns and sweats while the water freezes in the washbasin, and only supprative religious proclivities prevent the managing editor from shedding a shower of profanity.

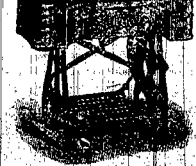
