

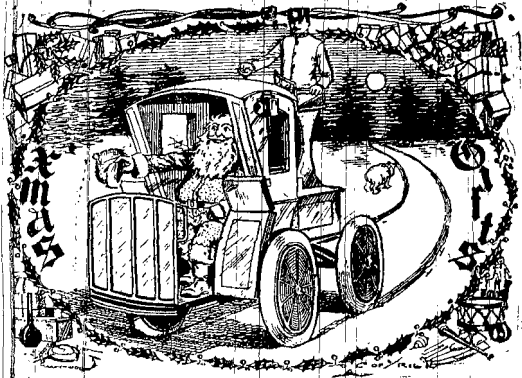

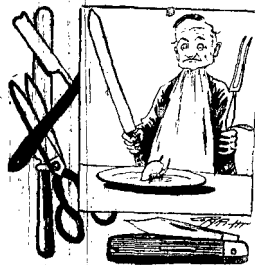

IN THE VICINITY.

The matter of installing a public lighting plant at Wisner has been revived.

Dixon has the prospect of a new general store which an Oakland man thinks of starting there.

C. T. Ecker of Dixon has bought an interest in a drug store at Concord and expects to start a newspaper there within a few weeks.

The 16-year-old son of Lute Marsh of McLean had one hip bone badly crushed last week by the weight of a horse falling on him.

The Index reports that J. L. Hurlbert and family have returned to their home near Carroll after several months' absence in California.

The school boards of Cedar county were to meet in Hartington on Wednesday of this week, when also a farmers' institute was to be held there.

Mrs. A. Ballantyne, aged 78 years, died of pneumonia at her home in Bloomfield on the 3rd inst. She and her family moved to Knox county in 1879.

August Langeo, postmaster at Monterey in Thurston county, was thrown

from a wagon while in West Point on Monday of last week and received injuries, from which he died on Friday.

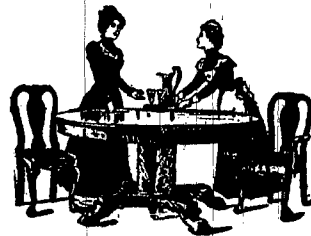

Mark Hanna is quoted as saying that he will not serve as chairman of the republican national committee again and that he has no intention of becoming a presidential candidate.

A Texas negro, guilty of assault, escaped lynching and was sentenced to a thousand years in the penitentiary. While he can live out comparatively little of his term, it gives him something extra to think about.

January 1st will usher in another leap year. There has been none since 1896. Usually increased privileges are granted the feminine portion every fourth year, but owing to the necessity of keeping time properly regulated, 1900, as a leap year, had to be foregone.

Democratic papers are very anxious about the political welfare of President Roosevelt. They commend him as an able executive, but seem to fear that the money power in his own party will defeat him. If that is the way they feel, they will be very happily surprised.

The United States government proposes to hereafter keep a large squadron of warships in South American waters and enforce the Monroe doctrine to the letter. European countries, anxiously watching for opportunities to have a finger in South American affairs, will have to keep their hands off without any fooling.

The Tekamah Journal remarks in reference to the public building for which Congressman McCarthy has introduced a bill, that "of course Wayne wants it." That's correct. Wayne knows a good thing and has the good sense and energy to go after it. Second only to Norfolk in size and second to none in the spirit of push and enterprise, what town in northern Nebraska is more deserving of a public building than Wayne?

Since the exposure of the financial troubles in Zion and the squinting of its inhabitants under the lash of their aversion leader, fewer people are apt to become afflicted with Dowisitis in the future. Many who were deluded into joining the host of the self-styled Elijah, have discovered their folly and quit Zion, poorer in purse, but richer in experience.

Last week's Pender Times devoted a

column and a half to short letters from Pender youths addressed to Santa Claus and telling him what they wanted for Christmas. Some were rather extravagant in their desires, while others proposed to be satisfied with a few things. They showed perfect confidence that Santa Claus could fulfill their wishes, and their parents or others interested in them will undoubtedly see that he does so.

The Washington authorities have ruled that the widows who came to Nebraska in car load lots to take homesteads to turn them over to cattle companies will have their entries canceled unless they continue to live on the land. The Fremont Tribune adds: This is a lonely prospect for the widows. To sentence them to solitary confinement in the sand hills for five years is about as bad as being sent up for murder, for murderers usually get out after a few years.

There seems to be a turkey famine, unprecedented in many years. This is said to be due to excessive rains, before which the turkey variety fell like grain before a reaper. A young turkey is a tender bird and cannot stand much moisture. It flourishes best during seasons of drouth when Russian thistles are abundant, and other crops are short, and populism is in the ascendency. Thus it would appear that turkeys are more plentiful when the harvest falls and times are hard. And if the favorite barnyard bird is to be scarce at any time it is doubtless better to be so during an era of prosperity. Let these reflections console people in the event there are not enough turkeys to supply the demand. We should rest content with chickens, ducks, geese, or ancient or modern vintage, or even canned milk—Balsam's, at that,—if necessary, rather than have turkeys as thick as leaves in Va. ambrosia, co-incident with a period of depression and commercial calamity.
