This has been for years one of the noted herds of Aberdeen-Angus cattle of the northwest and this animal will surely add to the already high reputation the herd enjoys. It is today so that any person looking for something to improve his herds or flocks can with safety come to Wayne county and find the very best in cattle, hogs or poultry.

Farmers should be on their guard with regard to having their cattle inspected by a so-called government inspector. Make him prove himself. Such a graft is being worked in some parts of the state. A fellow calls at the farm, claiming to be a representative of the government, inspecting cattle for contagious disease. He makes the inspection, demands and often receives his five dollar fee and departs rejoicing. Such a man can find a few suckers in any part of the country, no matter how often the local papers call on its readers to be on their guard.—Laurel Advocate.

Wayne county chicken breeders are fully alive to the necessity of bettering their flocks or else John Kate is not an authority on this matter, and we believe he is as well if not better posted in regard to the matter than any other person in the county. John says the demand for full-blooded roosters this spring has been greater than the supply and most if not all of the breeders have disposed of everything in this line. People are fast being made to realize that chickens are among the most profitable things that can be kept on the farm and that only the best goes at this time.

It is no snap to be obliged to shoulder the responsibilities that justly belong to you in this life, but the burden becomes doubly heavy when you are forced to shoulder the shortcomings of others. This is about the position the HERALD occupies because of its absorption of the Wayne Republican. All its sins of omission and commission are charged to us by some who do not seem to be able to fully realize that we are not the natural heirs to the follies and shortcomings of that defunct sheet. Now brethren we are not the collection agency for the Republican, and don't send out by that paper are not for subscriptions due on the HERALD, but for the amount you owe the Republican and we hope you will get this matter straightened in your mind. We have plenty to do in taking care of our own affairs without being charged with matters in which we are not in any manner interested.

If those opposed to three or more saloons in Wayne and who desire to lessen the number of such places in the city will see that the Stoumb liquor law is strictly enforced they can quickly reduce the number of these places. Compel the city authorities to enforce the classes prohibiting minors from be-

ing allowed in these places, see that the sale of liquor to habitual drunkards is carried out and look after the anti-treating part of the law. Don't expect somebody else to do these things while you simply stand back and kick, but do something yourself. If you believe or know, as you say you do, that some of the men operating the drink establishments are not of good moral character and are unfit for the business, put in a remonstrance against their being granted permits, and back up the remonstrance with proof, and don't expect the city council to take your word or general report as proof of the truth of these things.

The Wayne telephone directory (Independent) has just been issued and carries 649 names, that can be reached through the exchange at this point. Of these 649 subscribers, 386 are credited to the city of Wayne and the farm lines leading out from the Wayne exchange. Carroll rural lines carry 160 names, Concord rural and town lines have 107 and Sholes has 44. Besides the lines named, the rural lines leading out from Wakefield can be reached by any subscriber on the Wayne lines. This pretty nearly puts you in communication with every person in the county. The Independent is constantly having new farm lines added and it is pretty safe to predict that within a year there will scarcely be a home anywhere in the county or territory tributary to Wayne that cannot be reached by phone. One thing is quite badly needed and that is a free wire between Wayne, Winside, Hoskins, Carroll and Wakefield and with this up and in operation everybody would be happy.

It's up to you to get out Tuesday and do the voting act and if you stay at home and neglect to exercise your right then don't be a kicker. The HERALD has little time for the man who is too good to attend caucuses and help put in nomination good men for office and less use for the one who stays at home on election day and then kicks on what the majority of his fellows do. The "kicker" is of small moment anywhere and especially in a country where all men are on an equality so far as exercising the right of franchise is concerned and it believes that while majorities are not always right, but in most cases they come pretty near the mark. If at this period in life there is not a co-operation on the part of parents with teachers, the public schools are not able to perform their mission properly. The parent who listens to the tales of woe brought home from school and gives encouragement to the boy or girl in anything subversive of good discipline in the schools, they are bidding for future trouble for both themselves and the children. Uphold the teacher. Give the boy or girl to understand there are a few things they don't know, and impress on them the fact that a lady or gentleman seldom has any trouble with other people, and in after years when these same youngsters become men and women they will rise up and bless your memory.
