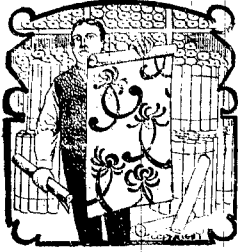

Thomas Horrigan who makes his home with Mrs. Eugene Sullivan met with an accident Saturday evening on his way home from town that caused quite a ripple of excitement for a while. From some cause or other the gentleman who is quite elderly, lost his balance and fell from the wagon in which he was riding alone and was picked up by John Muth, who found him in a semi-conscious condition and was quickly brought to town and carried into the office of Dr. Lelsanring who failed to find anything seriously wrong except that the old gentleman was somewhat jarred up.

The Bloomfield branch of the Omaha must certainly be one of the best paying pieces of road the corporation owns. There are two regular trains per day each way on this forty mile branch and all these trains are mixed, that is both carry freight and passengers. Every train is a good big one, about all the engines can haul. They are loaded with merchandise and passengers going north

and the return trip brings passengers, grain and live stock. It really looks as though there is sufficient passenger traffic on this branch to afford at least one exclusive passenger train each way daily and we know the people living along the line would heartily appreciate such service if it were given them.

The lecture given the teachers of Pierce county and vicinity by Prof. Gregg of the Wayne Normal College on the 18th inst., was very interesting and was received with enthusiasm. Prof. Gregg endeavored to make it clear to his hearers that the period of development and the time within which the real preparation for life must be made is the period before the age of twenty-five is reached. He cited instances from history to show the backing for this statement. However, he explained how people can secure the growth of branch nerve cells so that after that period new energies and new life can be put forth and original work done right along even to old age. He showed that the fountain of youth is found by taking up something new every once in a while and the mind grows fresh and strong with the new pursuit. He said that people die too early because they cease to keep their minds active; that men retire from farming or other business and if they do not keep themselves busy with something they soon die. The talk was very suggestive and Prof. Gregg speaks with a clearness and effect that are attractive.—Pierce Call.

"There is nothing I like better than to take care of sheep and they are the most profitable animals I raise on the farm," said John R. Morris of Carroll to the writer a few days ago. "I have tended sheep ever since I was a very small boy, beginning in my native land of Wales, where we allowed the animals to graze and live on the mountain sides during the entire summer and fall. Sheep are peculiar animals and are very fixed in their habits. I remember back in the old country that nearly every ewe had her own home on the mountain where she would take up her abode in some nice little dell and there rear her young and stay there all summer, never wandering very far away from that particular vicinity and we always knew just where to look for each animal and her young. It seemed to be her home and instead of going in flocks as here, each one had her own particular habitation. My father always kept sheep and each animal was given a name by which it was known to all the members of our family and thus we were always able to tell about any particular animal we wished to designate. I have now about 300 ewes and they have about forty lambs, but the real time of having their young does not begin until about April 15. I do not part with my good motherly ewes as do some breeders, because I figure it is more profitable to keep a good old ewe that will raise two good lambs than to part with her, because about \$4 is all you can get for her for mutton purposes, whereas the lambs she will raise each season will bring from \$10 to \$15, depending of course on the price of mutton. Say, I would sooner go out among my flock of sheep and take care of them than to go away on any pleasure trip, because I can enjoy it much more." The love of his animals and the intelligent care he exercises over them is the great secret of Mr. Morris' success with his flocks and it is so with any man who expects to succeed along this line.

Last week the writer made a trip up into South Dakota, going as far west as Miller, the county seat of Hand county and found plenty of company traveling that way. Seeding is in full swing all the way from Sioux City and the ground seemed to us to be in splendid condition for putting in the crop. The towns and country are improving very rapidly, new houses and barns being erected everywhere and they are of the good, substantial kind, indicating that the people have faith in the permanence of their present prosperous condition. The country west of Huron which until three years ago was badly neglected is being filled up pretty rapidly with settlers and on all sides new farm buildings are going up, new lands broken out and the whole face of the country being changed. Four years ago lands that are today worth \$10 to \$15, could have been purchased for \$3 to \$4 per acre and those that are now selling at \$20 to \$25, could have been had at from \$5 to \$8 per acre. Formerly the only crops produced were wheat and mortgages, but a change has come over the spirit of the man now possessing and living in that country and cattle, corn and hops are looked upon as great factors in its permanent prosperity. The dairy is getting to be one of the most profitable interests in that section of country and many farmers that a few years ago were just living from hand to mouth raising wheat, have since they began to milk the cows and make butter been able to not only lift the mortgage from the original holdings, but have added quarter after quarter section to their belongings and have built comfortable houses and good barns and are today prosperous and happy as farmers anywhere. Most years good corn is grown when the land is properly farmed, but it is a fact that a very small percentage is farmed as it should be. Too many farmers there, like in all new countries, are of the shiftless, careless class that are of the earth to yield them an abundance with very little effort on their part. But this poor class of farmers are gradually giving away to their more industrious, thrifty brethren who

believe the world doesn't owe them anything except an opportunity and who believe that few places offer as many opportunities to a man of small means and a disposition to hustle as does this part of South Dakota, and the success they are attaining is proof positive that they have sized up the situation about correctly. In most of this country plenty of water can be obtained in wells at a depth of from 80 to 100 feet and in all of its artesian wells are to be had, at depths ranging from 900 to 1400 feet and at a cost from \$400 to \$500 per well, and after this water is gotten there is no expense for pumps or windmills; water is always there in great abundance and at the same temperature summer or winter, the temperature being generally about 80 degrees above zero. There can be no doubt that this country has a grand future in store for the men who are willing to stay by it and follow the kind of farming to which the country is best adapted, and who are not afraid to put in good hard licks and plenty of them in order to succeed.
