HANG MURDERER

Slayer of D. C. Montgomery Executed.

MURDER COMMITTED IN 1902

Mr. Montgomery Formerly Pastor of First Presbyterian Church in this City--Went From Here to Philippines.

The Manila, P. I. Times of April 26, 1905, gives the following account of the execution of the murderer of Rev. D. C. Montgomery, for several years pastor of the Presbyterian church of this place and later Superintendent of schools for the province of Oriental Negro: "Calidong, the murderer of Superintendent of Schools Montgomery, was hanged this morning in the plaza front of the provincial jail. The drop was sprung at eight o'clock sharp, death being pronounced twelve and a half minutes later. Accompanied by a Spanish priest he walked with a firm step from the provincial jail to the scaffold and mounted the steps, arriving on the platform he made a speech in Visayan expressing repentance for his crime. Three officers and forty men of the constabulary formed a square around the scaffold. Venancia Calidong murdered D. O. Montgomery on the evening of October 31, 1902, mistaking him for the Provincial Treasurer, W. G. Hollis. Mr. Montgomery, who was superintendent of schools for the province of Oriental Negro, was traveling on horseback from Silay to Bacool to take over property from Superintendent G. W. Beattie, of Negro Occidental. When a short distance from Bacool Mr. Montgomery was waylaid by seven natives armed with spears, bolos and daggers. He was dragged from his horse and foully murdered, Calidong giving him the coup de grace in the form of a dagger thrust. Calidong was captured three weeks later along with another in a nipa shack between Silay and Saravia, two others who were also in the shack being killed while attempting to escape. The other man captured along with Calidong was acquitted for want of sufficient evidence to convict, although when captured he had on a pair of khaki trousers belonging to the murdered man."
