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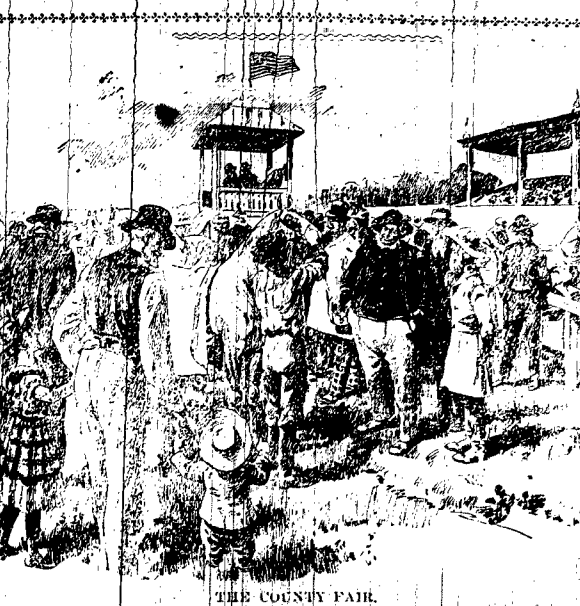

COLLEGE NOTES.

There were seven students from Vonnos enroll Monday and six from Orohard.
