SUNDAY SCHOOL REVIVAL TONIGHT

Self Appointed Second Christ Working People Near Pender--Wayne Horseman Wins at Sioux City--Democratic Brethren Meet Saturday.

The Stock Show and Races.

This fair organization is composed of thirty of Wayne's business men and the object of the fair is to give a place each year for the people of Wayne county to meet each other and be entertained by seeing the best stock in the county and enjoy first class racing. There has been expended in permanent improvements about \$5,000, and each year all the profits will be invested on the grounds to make each entertainment "better" than the preceding one. The amphitheater has a seating capacity of two thousand and will afford a comfortable place for you to witness the best races ever given in Wayne. All races are now filled and you will see the same horses go here that go this week at the Sioux City fair.

The stock show promises to be equal to some state fairs. Every stock raiser within fifty miles has promised to be here and every animal will be purchased and fitted for this occasion. No farmer can afford to miss seeing this collection of prize-bred stock. There is now on the ground two large tents, 60 by 90 feet, affording cover for three hundred cattle and hogs. Stanchions are made for the different animals, so they can be looked at by visitors in good light and in a clean place. The hog department will be an interesting feature, as all the prize-bred hogs in the county are expected on exhibition. The horses and sheep will be represented in spooly numbers.

The poultry department will be one of the interesting places for ladies especially for this part of the fair will be conducted the same as a poultry show. All birds will be exhibited in standard-size exhibition coops, giving a splendid chance for visitors to see them. It is expected that over two hundred fine pure-bred birds will be exhibited at this fair.

There will be all kinds of amusement to interest every one. The social feature alone is worth coming for, as it is always pleasant to meet friends at a fair.

Every person in Wayne county should attend. This fair is not gotten up to make money for the stockholders, but for the purpose of bringing the people together and affording a place for the stockmen to show their stock and also to advertise the town of Wayne. All should feel that by attending this fair they are helping to build a permanent organization that will conduct a fair each year in Wayne and make it better every year. The music is well worth the price of admission. The Sioux City band will play each day on the ground.

Come every day, as each day will be a big one and you will miss it if you do not come every day to attend. Bring all your family and make it a special holiday and visit your friends, as well as see the best fair ever held in Wayne county. Everything will be conducted on a moral plan and there will be nothing to offend the most refined taste.

You are invited to the fair and see one of the best county fairs in the state. The merchants all extend an invitation to you to make your headquarters at their stores and leave anything you desire for safe keeping, which will be returned to you free of charge when you call for it. The beautiful lawns of Wayne are yours if you desire to use them for picnic dinners. Make your selves at home and enjoy the fair. Let us make this the last chance of the season, a grand gathering, long to be remembered, and next year the fair will be better and bigger.

TICKET IS NAMED

Republicans Meet to Make Nominations.

SUPERINTENDENCY CONTESTED

All Other Nominations by Acclamation--Clerkship to be Filled by Central Committee.

The republican county convention was called to order in Wayne Saturday afternoon by A. E. Davis, chairman of the county central committee. Whereupon R. D. Merrill was chosen temporary secretary. In response to a request from the chair, Rev. Thos. J. Wright offered prayer.

On motion, a committee on credentials, consisting of A. A. Welch, F. S. Tracy and Robert Jones, was appointed, and subsequently reported that all precincts were represented excepting Logan and Strahan. Parties from the latter precinct were found present and were duly authorized as delegates. Delegates present were authorized to cast full vote of precincts.

After the temporary organization was made permanent, a motion prevailed to appoint the following committee on resolutions: A. A. Welch, Gus Schroeder, and C. S. Hughes. Their resolutions were adopted and are the following: Resolved by the Republican party of Wayne county, Nebraska, in convention assembled:

First: "That we endorse the administration of President Roosevelt, and that we hereby instruct our delegates to the state convention to favor a resolution by the state convention, instructing our representative in congress to support the president in his efforts to make railroad legislation effective.

Second: "Be it further resolved that we endorse and approve the administration of Governor Miesky and all other state officers, and especially commend the state board of equalization in its efforts to secure just and equal assessments of all property within the state for taxation.

Third: "Be it further resolved that we believe that the Hon. W. P. Warner of Dakota City, Nebraska, would render the republican party great services if he were elected to the position of chairman of the republican state committee, and we hereby recommend that the delegates to the state convention from this county use all honorable means to secure Mr. Warner's election to this important office.

Fourth: "Believing that the action of our last county convention in recommending that the several members of the county central committee refrain from using their positions as such to advance the interest of any aspirant for appointment as postmaster within the county, has resulted in good to the party, we do hereby renew such recommendation."

Richard Closson, W. H. Gildersleeve and Dan Harrington were appointed to select delegates to the state convention, and accordingly the following names were presented and accepted: R. D. Merrill, J. J. Williams, A. R. Davis, F. S. Tracy, O. C. Lewis, Gus Schroeder, W. F. Soars, W. A. Miller, Wm. Prince, Robt. H. Jones, Evan Jenkins, C. W. Worth, Richard Closson.

List of persons chosen as members of the county central committee: O. C. Lewis, Breuna, Wm. Prince, Chapin; R. Closson, Deer Creek; D. E. Francis, Gaddfield; Otto Miller, Hancock; E. Tomplin, Hoskins; W. F. Soars, Hunter; Amos Long, Leslie; A. E. Gildersleeve, Plum Creek; Geo. Porter, Strahan; H. E. Hansen, Wilbur; F. S. Tracy, Winside; E. W. Hulse, Wayne, First ward; A. T. Witter, Wayne, Second ward; A. A. Welch, Wayne, Third ward.

On motion the selection of chairman and secretary of the county central committee was left to the candidates. Nominations for county officers followed in the order presented by the county central committee. E. Hunter for county judge, and Grant S. Mears for sheriff, were nominated by acclamation and without opposition.

For county superintendent, three names were presented, A. E. Little, of Winside, E. R. Gibson and C. L. Wright of Wayne. The vote resulted, Little 45 2-5; Gibson, 25 1-5; Wright, 10 1. Little having a majority was declared the nominee. Dr. J. J. Williams was nominated by acclamation, for coroner.

A motion carried to omit the nomination of a county clerk and authorize the central committee to select a candidate for the place if deemed best to do so. T. E. Evans for treasurer, E. R. Gibson for surveyor, and Richard Russell for commissioner, were chosen by acclamation. The county central committee was authorized to fill any vacancies.

At the close of the county convention, the delegates representing the three wards of Wayne, met and organized and nominated the following township officers: I. W. Alter and E. F. Feather, justices of the peace; Geo. Stringer, constable.

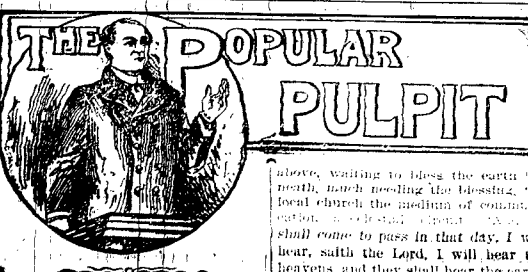

This was the last message our Lord gave to His disciples as a body. He spoke to them no more collectively. You may depend upon this, that St. John put down these words directly from the Master's lips, because they meant, and he intended they should mean, that faith in Christ should overcome the world, because Christ had already overcome it.

Christ is the misunderstood; the whole world has not really known its greatest man and its greatest man is not recognized face to face and heart to heart. We are very willing to blame the Jew or rejecting Jesus, but has our manner of life accepted Jesus? Throwing back our censures across the past centuries cannot atone for our scorn, our ignoring, our refusal of our sear. Conite refused to put the name of Christ in the Post-tivist calendar, and declared that He was one of many adventures; and while we resent this and nominally exalt Him in every day life pass by the results of His life and passion as though they were of small moment.

What is there for us to do? First, get back to the realization of Christ's lordship over all things. Then, tomorrow survey your field of fight afresh, but look upon it as won—won for you by Christ, won by you in Christ. Sheer trust in Christ brings us within the charmed circle of victory. You say that is a simple form of advice. Yes, but upon it hung the first estate of the angels; and upon it hinges your destiny.

Then they that gladly received his Word were baptized. And they continued steadfastly in the apostles' doctrine and fellowship. —Acts 2: 41, 42.

No one can read these words without feeling in them the strong pulse beat of a throbbing divine life in that early church. Some of the early fathers of the Church, on the banks of the Mississippi, things grew dull and heavy. The hills were silent, the logs lay dead on the log shore, business was almost at a standstill. What was the matter? The water was sent, the power was lost. Then all at once would come a flood that would lift the river to its brim. Straightway the logs were set afloat, the wheels began to turn and everything was in motion. Even so here we see the gathering of a mighty flood tide.
