IN REGARD TO HOG CHOLERA

One of Wayne county's most su ful hog raisers, who has had wide ex-perience in the treatment of hog chol-era or swine disease, says that he has found the best way to prevent hog cholera or to stamp it out of a herd after it has begun its deadly work, is to feed oats on a floor or platform where roen oats on a noor or piatrom where dirt and flith will not become mixed with feed, and use very little if any corn and oppedally avoid feeding recorn when the disease is in the neighborhood. Keep close watch of the hierd and if one refuses to eat seclude it from the others and if it refuses the second meal best thing to do is to starve him a few days and if he don't cure then kill the hog. Use crude carbolic acid diluted with water and scatter it over the hoge and premises with a whisk broom and don't be stingy in the use of the preventatives of disease thit can be used. Don't allow the animals to be-come constipated, ke-p bowels active by feeding oil cake as constipation will surely breed disease. Above all things keep premises clean and furnish ani-mals plenty of good, pure water to drink.






